

Five More Players Sign Contracts With Islanders

Five hockey players signed contracts with the Islanders yesterday, bringing to twelve the number of athletes who have signed with the local club this season.

Three of those who signed yesterday were members of last year's team. They were forwards Connie Bonhomme, Hub Beaudry, Gary Gordon and defencemen George McLagan and Lou Kielley. Bonhomme, Beaudry and McLagan played with the Islanders last season.

Right winger Gary Gordon arrived in the city from Vancouver yesterday morning. The big forward, who is only 21 years of age, delighted railbirds with his initial appearances despite the fact that he is above playing weight.

Left winger Bill Hagen who played with the Canucks last season, will leave the west coast for Charlottetown tonight.

Leftwinger Bobby Dowling appears to be a good bet to catch on with the Islanders as utility forward. Chamberlain commented favorably last night on Dowling's goal scoring ability and stated that the Charlottetown player had improved considerably since he last saw him two years ago.

Donald Campbell, Islanders' netminder from Toronto, will arrive today or tomorrow.

The rumpus broke out between periods, Richard had left the game and, in street clothes, was standing near the boards watching the play. At the time he said he was the object of vituperative comment by a fan. As he left to make his way elsewhere there was a tussle and Canadiens players climbed over the boards and waded in to Richard's assistance.

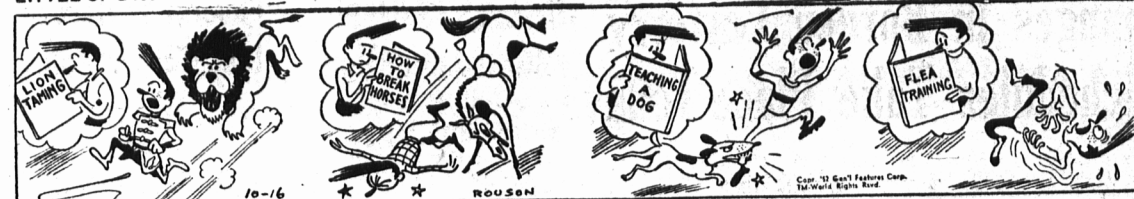

Casey Stengel Picked As Manager Of The Year

NEW YORK, Oct. 15 (AP)—Honors keep piling up on Casey Stengel. The grizzled 61-year-old pilot of the world champion New York Yankees today was named Manager of the Year for the second time by baseball writers in an Associated Press poll.

While it was not exactly a landslide, Stengel had a much easier time of it in the voting than his Yankees did in winning their fourth consecutive world championship under his direction.

Stengel was named on 37 of the 72 ballots. He netted more votes than the combined total of the 15 other managers. Stengel first won the poll in 1949.

Eddie Stanky, a huge success in his freshman year as manager of the third-place St. Louis Cardinals, was second with 10 votes, giving scrappy Eddie the title of National League Manager of the Year. His total doubled that of Leo Durocher, voted Manager of the Year last year.

Stanky edged out Jimmy Dykes, colorful Philadelphia Athletics skipper. Dykes received eight votes equally well. Gordon played with Vancouver last year and with Barrie Flyers in 1950.

Those who watched Gary Gordon at practise yesterday left the Forum with the opinion that Chamberlain has coralled a pretty good right winger. Gordon is a big boy with a playing weight of around 185 pounds but at present he is 12 pounds over his regular weight. Chamberlain claims he is very fast and goes both ways.

Shakedown Of Series Receipts

NEW YORK, Oct. 15 (AP)—The \$500,000.28 World Series' player pool yielded checks ranging from \$6,026.32 for each full Yankee share to \$66.13 for some Philadelphia Phillies club house help.

Commissioner Ford Frick announced the official breakdown of series receipts today. The net receipts for the seven games were \$1,622,753.01 including the player pool, commissioner's share of \$243,412.96 and \$219,834.20 each for the Yankee club owners, Dodger club owners and National League office and American League office.

The Yanks whacked up 37 full shares and took care of a total of 46 men with full and partial shares and cash payments.

Gerry Coleman, Dr. Bobby and Tom Morgan, all in service, were remembered for three-quarter shares of \$4,519.73. Ewell Blackwell and Ray Scarborough, late season additions, each got \$4,017.54 and Charlie Keller, called out of retirement to help down the stretch got \$1,000.

Brooklyn included 44 men with 29 full shares amounting to \$4,200.64 each. Don Newcombe and Erv Palca, both in service, were voted \$500 each.

Cleveland, like the Yanks, also took care of 46 men, 27 of them on full shares of \$1,066.35 for their second place finish. The New York Giants had 31 full shares of \$1,071.44.

Third place brought \$672.98 to each of 36 Chicago White Sox. The St. Louis Cards had 29 full shares of \$775.01 each.

The Philadelphia Phillies took care of both their old manager, Eddie Sawyer, and their new boss, Steve O'Neil, with 31 full shares of \$378.79. The Athletics, fourth in the American, each got \$337.84 for 35 full shares.

Both pitchers Rodney MacInnis of Tignish and Paul Jay of Peakes showed a lot of class, especially in the second game. Their hurling was the more remarkable when one considers that they made the trip with the St. Dunstan's football team to Antigonish on Saturday and were up at 5:30 Sunday morning in order to get back in time for the game. Both men went in as relief hurlers early in the first game, completed that contest and pitched the full five innings of the second. We would like to have a look at either hurler in the Island League.

The Peakes Bombers also deserve commendation. Peakes has been fielding top notch ball teams longer than the writer can remember. Jimmy "Fiddle" MacDonald coached Peakes in their final appearance last Sunday and as he has done so often in the past Jimmy came up with another good performance. The Bombers won the first game 7-6 in nine innings and with a few breaks might have come through in the second. However the slants and fastball of MacInnis was a little too much for them.

Jimmy Carter Regains Lightweight Ch'ship

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (AP)—Jimmy Carter, in complete charge throughout with harpooning lefts and crashing rights, regained his lightweight championship tonight by scoring a unanimous 15-round decision over game and bloody Lauro Salas of Monterrey, Mexico.

The title changed hands before one of the smallest world championship crowds in modern boxing history—5,269—at the Chicago Stadium.

The unanimous decision for the frozen - faced viciously efficient negro scrapper reclaimed the title the 29-year-old Carter had lost to Salas in Los Angeles May 14.

Salas was a gamecock all the way as he sought desperately to remain the only Mexican ever to hold an undisputed title.

But in becoming the first lightweight to regain his title since Lou Ambers turned the trick in 1939, Carter was in charge most of the way with razor-sharp combinations that brushed aside the peek-a-boo crouch of the persistent Salas.

There were no knockdowns although Carter turned loose all his guns in the 15th round trying to be the first man to floor the Mexican.

Carter's left hook was used magnificently throughout the fight and often he followed with whistling right crosses that jolted Salas.

Referee Frank Gilmer voted for Carter 81-69 under the Illinois scoring system which usually gives a round winner a 6-4 edge. Judge Frank McAdams gave it to Jimmy by the widest margin, 84-66, while the other judge, James McManus voted for the new champion, 82-68.
