SIR CHARLES IN MONTREAL

Canada's Lost Opportunities

The Government Regret that the Lead of Their Predecessors Had Not Been Followed.

MONTREAL, Sept. 20.—Sir Charles Upper was a passenger in the Parisian, which reached Montreal on Saturday night.

When seen Sir Charles said that he had declined to accept an invitation to the Jubilee festivities where there were opportunities for speaking, because he disapproved of the attitude in respect to Preferential Trade within the Empire adopted by Canada's Premier. He believed that a great opportunity had been lost for Canada. Canada would have been supported by all the autonomous colonies except New South Wales if she had stood out for Preferential Trade. The Duke of Devonshire's speech at Liverpool was unmistakably a proposal of Preferential Trade.

Speaking of the fast line, Sir Charles said he had no doubt that the Government now regretted not having carried out the late Government's proposition.

END OF GRECO-TURKISH WAR

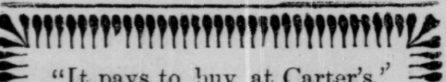
Terms of Peace Give Turkey a Little Slice of Territory.

Greeks Don't Like the Treaty.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—An official end was put to the Greco-Turkish war by the Sultan signing the terms of peace on Saturday.

The Sultan's final promptitude in signing is ascribed to the impossibility of further maintaining the army in Thessaly, owing to the increase of sickness among the troops. It is understood that the strategic frontier established by the treaty gives Turkey the village of Konzofoani, from which the raid into Macedonia was made, which raid was the immediate cause of the war. The treaty also gives Turkey Zarkos, Gunitza, Melana and Rapsani.

The Greek press pronounce the conditions exceedingly onerous.

BAD MANAGEMENT AT OTTAWA.

Great Addition to the Public Debt.

REVENUE DECREASING, EXPENDITURE INCREASING.

Sir Oliver's Ultimatum.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—The official returns show an increase of the net debt amounting to \$4,547,703 during the first two months of the current fiscal year.

The revenue shows a decrease of half a million in the consolidated fund, and the expenditure an increase of \$336,700. In the capital expenditure there is an increase of a quarter million.

The capital expenditure on public works alone is increased from \$188 to \$264,793.

The trade returns show an increase of a half million each in the value of imports and exports.

The Cabinet Council on Saturday discussed the resignation of Sir Oliver Mowat. Sir Oliver's insistence upon being succeeded by the Hon. David Mills has quite complicated the situation, the Premier himself and several of his colleagues having entertained quite another plan for filling the vacancy.

The Cabinet met again this morning. But the result of the meeting has not yet been announced.

FIGHTING IN INDIA.

A Decided British Victory.

The Enemy Compelled to Retire With Heavy Loss.

BOMBAY, Sept. 20.—Advices from the front show that the various columns of the British-Indian force advancing against the Mamounds, are meeting with no serious opposition.

General Jeffries' brigade re-attacked the enemy at the village of Damodata. The enemy made a desperate resistance, but were driven into the hills. The British demolished their towers and captured four hundred mule loads of supplies.

TWO STEAMERS WRECKED.

Crews of Both are Safe.

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 20.—Two steamers became total wrecks on Saturday night on the southern shore between Cape Race and St. John's.

They are the British steamer Rhodesia from Boston for Philadelphia, and the Norwegian steamer Eugenie, Shields for Louisburg, C. B. The crews of both steamers escaped after suffering great hardships.

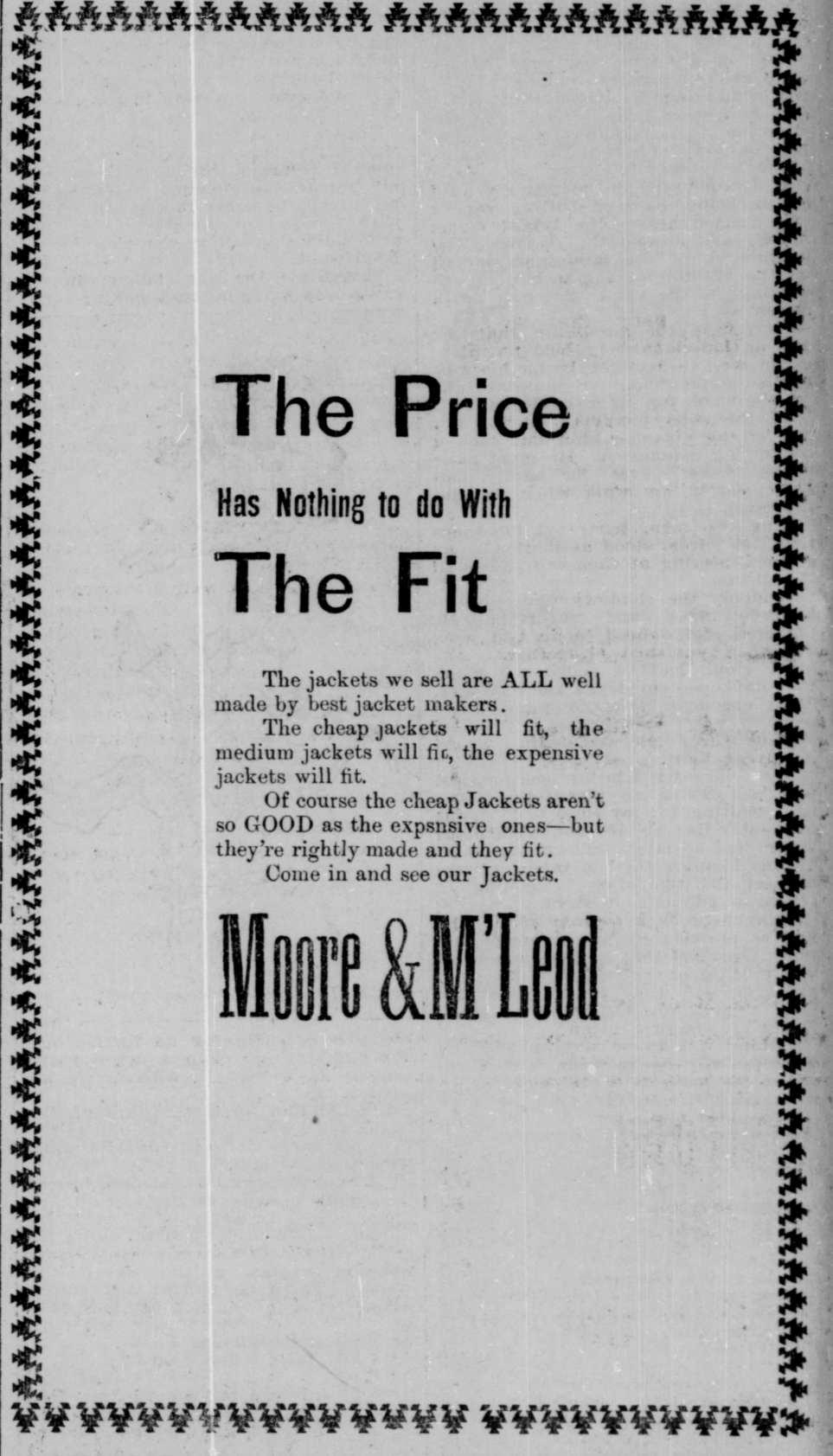
