CITY MOVES

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No one in a legitimate taxi business can operate a taxi business here on 25 cents fare, stated Mr. Acorn. He said it meant cutting down the number of employees, in his case from 23 to 11. Only about two taxis are left in the City as operators, he stated, the rest were turned over to the drivers. The drivers buy their own cars and he feared that the expenses were so high that every taxi cab in Charlottetown would be owned by the car dealers in 12 months. Councilor Gormley brought up the matter of people coming in from the country and operating a taxi during the winter and Old Home Week. Mr. Acorn stated that this was the case and that all these people had to do was pay a \$15 license fee and go into business during the plush periods. The Council gave a notice of motion to deal with the matter and decided to meet with all taxi drivers in Charlottetown concerning the matter. A temporary revised rate was put into effect some time ago but a number of the operators returned to the old prices.

Welcome Sign

An electric welcome sign to the City will be installed on Elm Avenue before Festive Week in July. Mayor MacDonald requested the finance committee and the chairman of streets, Coun. J. D. Stewart, and the chairman of public property, Coun. G. R. Keefe to take care of the matter. He also asked that all entrances be cleaned up.

Councillors J. D. Stewart, Lester O'Donnell, and Wendall Beaton were appointed from the Council to assist the Festive Week committees.

The week of May 13-19 will be proclaimed "Boys and Girls Week", it was decided in keeping with the practice throughout Canada and the United States. Coun. Edwin Johnstone made the request on behalf of the Charlottetown Rotary Club, who in conjunction with other Rotary Clubs, sponsor the week.

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To Investigate Starch Factory Waste At Murray Harbor

An investigation will be carried out at Murray Harbor to determine whether starch factory waste is injurious to lobsters, it was learned yesterday. Dr. D. G. Wilder, Dominion fisheries biologist at St. Andrews, N. B., has arrived in the Province to conduct the survey.

The starch factory at Murray Harbor closed Saturday after operating one day, pending an investigation. Operators of lobster ponds downstream from the factories complained the waste from the factory would injure the lobsters.

Farmers in the Murray Harbor area have thousands of bushels of potatoes to dispose of and are anxious to see the factory operate.

Capt. Brown Winds Up Ice Patrols

Captain Angus Brown wound up his ice patrols yesterday after what he termed a "freak year", in which there was little ice but what there was took a long time to clear.

He reported that both the Northumberland Strait and the Gulf of St. Lawrence were free of ice and that fishermen would have the all clear for the opening of the lobster season today.

Closing date of the ice patrols this year are the second earliest on record. The earliest was 1949 when he wound up his patrols on April 25. In contrast last year's patrol on May 13 was the latest in six years.

Captain Brown reported that he had an easy season this year as he only made 17 patrols in comparison to 29 a year ago.

Tribute To Commissioner

Leaders of all three parties in Opposition joined in Mr. Garson's tribute to Commissioner Wood and the Mounties.
