POTATOES.—The market was over-supplied and very dull during the first part of the week, but the low prices checked shipments somewhat and with lighter receipts for the past three days, the market has been working into better condition. At the close there is a moderate demand for choice sound eastern stock at the roads at 40 to 45c.

FISH.—A very good demand is reported for most all kinds of fish and prices are generally well sustained. Codfish keep well sold up at full quotations. Herring in steady demand. Mackerel in moderate supply and a shade firmer.

ESCA.—Receipts continue quite liberal, but still run largely to held stock so that the supply of strictly choice fresh laid is only moderate. Demand for choice fresh stock has been good with prices ruling as last quoted. Strictly fresh-laid Nova Scotia, N B and Michigan keep well sold up at 21c. Choice fresh Western steady at 20c. Held stock in full supply at 18 to 19c. P E Island, N S and N B 20 to 21c.

POULTRY.—Receipts of eastern chickens and fowls have not been very heavy this week, and the small lots of choice stuff arriving bring full prices. Some extra large chickens exceed quotations. Live stuff has been in full supply at 10 to 11c for both chickens and fowls.

Presbyterianism in P. E. Island.

According to a correspondent of the Presbyterian Witness, "it appears that there are in this Province 33 Presbyterian congregations, and that 30 of these have settled ministers. Of the 5,891 communicants, 611 were added during the past year. Ten years ago there were but 25 churches and 3,672 communicants. Ten years ago the total amount given for all purposes was \$29,161, while for the past year it has been \$46,468. There are only two congregations—St. James's, Charlottetown and Summerside—that give more than two dollars to the schemes per communicant; while 21 give less than one dollar. This may partly be accounted for by the augmentation scheme in absorbing all the resources of the weaker congregations. My memory carries me back to a time when there was a very different state of things. Such is the affect of union and organization and the lesson should not be lost upon Presbyterians in P. E. Island and elsewhere."

Parnell and Ireland.

(Freeman's Journal, Dublin.)

"When the hopes of the country are high and the outside world has begun to recognize that the Irish nation is a force worth respecting, some matter of detail or of self arises, passionate are influenced and the bond of union is broken.

"This has happened to-day, and one man has caused it all.

"It is absolutely necessary that the independence of the Irish party should be maintained. Independence, however, does not imply perpetual antagonism.

"Independent support and independent alliance may be as useful as independent opposition. It would be madness to oppose any party in the act of conceding Irish rights.

"The Irish people must be united to be strong. The man who stands between our people and union must be content to be regarded as a foe.

"That man is Charles Stewart Parnell. That public spirit which will secure the union is the best and only real guarantee of our independence."

Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The British steamer Nova Scotia, from Baltimore, arrived at Liverpool to-day. She had on board the crew of the fisherman Sherbrooke, abandoned in a sinking condition on the 17th inst.

MONTREAL, Sept. 25.—R. N. O'Brien of Halifax, and brother of the Rev. Gregor O'Brien, S. J., was put on trial to-day in the court of Queen's bench charged with libelling Prince George of Wales last September. O'Brien wired to several New York papers that the Prince had been arrested and locked up after a free fight on the street at midnight.

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 25.—Eleven people are dead and thirty wounded as the result of a bomb explosion at the Italian celebration of the feast of St. Rocco last night. The bombs were filled with colored fire and shot into the air from a mortar, when hundreds of men, women and children were around. Nearly all the dead and most of the injured are children, and all but one or two reside in Newark. Others will probably die. The explosion is supposed to have been due to an over-charge of powder.

The Best Society.

The so-called "best society" is full of deceit and hypocrisy and sin. The really best society is made up of cultured Christians. It is cultured. That word is not defined by a smattering of poor French and music, a bit of fancy work, or the latest sensational novel. It means ground ploughed up, soil broken and mellowed, fertilized and fruitful. Such is the meaning of the supine *cultum* of the Latin verb *colo*. Thus a cultured man is one who, by diligence and patience and hard work, has broken up, mellowed and strengthened his nature until he is self-possessed, disciplined and fruitful. He has studied and acquired and appropriated until he knows. He possesses experience and virtue, strength and wisdom, and uses them, impelled by the motive of love, for his own and his neighbor's character building. Culture is not the waltz or the euche pack or the whist party, the gambling parlor, the opera, or the cup of wine. Nor is it found in perumes, satins, lace handkerchiefs, or airs. Neither is it mere wealth or position, for these may easily be had by deceit and inordinate presumption. Culture never comes except through the media of effort, and sacrifice, and diligence.

Now, if you add to the true culture Christianity, you have the very best society. Mind, we are not speaking of the ignorant professor of religion who simply prates of his goodness. For him we hope we have charity, but with him we have little sympathy. We refer to the strong, substantial, matter-of-fact, aspiring Christian, who knows in whom he believes and, "living all diligence, adds to his faith knowledge, courage, temperance, patience, gentleness, brotherly kindness and love." He lives well, enjoys life, wears a smile, rests in the certainty of his religion and in the truthfulness and triumph of his faith. He pays his debts, gives honest remuneration to others, is broad, liberal, straightforward and pious. A man of deep conviction, loyalty to truth and strong purpose, he loves God and his fellowmen and dares to witness his experience. Such a man is the Christian of our thought. He is a man of flesh and blood, enjoys good health, eats three meals a day, understands himself in business and political life, and lives right down here among men. If we are not blinded by prejudice, or by that sickly sentiment which expects Christianity to whitewash fools, we can easily find him. There are thousands of him, and we bless him in the name of God and humanity and heaven. If you like him, you had better keep him company.

Stopped by Russia

Russia, which claims absolute supremacy over the region, has forbidden the English Captain Younghusband to enter the Little Pamir in Central Asia. Captain Younghusband is one of the best known of oriental travellers. He has made the longest journey in Chinese territory ever accomplished by a European unless Marco Polo beat him. His journey from Manchuria to East Turkestan was about 6,000 miles long. He has also written one of the best known books on Siam. It was recently announced that the purpose of his present expedition was to make new explorations in Thibet. The Pamir is on the border of the Chinese possession of East Turkestan. Pamir means "the roof of the world," and the Pamir plateau is the loftiest on earth. Little Pamir is in the south-east part of this territory, and here rises the chief head waters of the Amu Daria, or the ancient Oxus river. It is likely that Russia does not so much object to Younghusband's presence in the Pamir as to his passing through that country on the way to Thibet, where the Russians seem anxious to monopolize the work of exploration.

SEAL FISHING.—Advices from British Columbia place the total catch of seal taken in Behring Sea this season by Canadian vessels at 12,000, against 13,000 skins last year. Sir Julian Pauncefote has protested to the State Department at Washington against the violation of the *modus vivendi* by United States vessels by taking seal in excess of the maximum limit thereby prescribed (7,500), while British vessels have captured nearly twice that number.

There is a plague of locusts in some provinces of Buenos Ayres.

The neighborhood of Vandalia, Ill., has been without rain for a month, and the situation is alarming. Pastures are burnt up and wells are dry.

Exports for August were ten million dollars. The balance at the credit of depositors in postoffice savings banks in Canada increased eighteen thousand dollars during the last month.
