

Islanders, Millionaires Play For Second Place In Game Here Tonight

The revamped Sydney Millionaires, already being compared in some circles to the Millionaires of former years, return to the Forum tonight to meet the Islanders in a battle for sole possession of second place in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

The new Millionaires under the crafty guidance of Terry Reardon will be attempting to break the Islanders' win streak on their home ice. Trainer's charges have given command performances in their home games to account for their three victories.

There will likely be a new player in the Islanders camp tonight but he won't see action. The player is Marty Burton, a 24 year old forward, who played last year with Sudbury Wolves and has been unable to come to terms with the Sudbury club this year.

Trainer stated last night that he expected Burton would be a great addition to the team. "We have very good recommendations on him. He is aggressive and a good two way skater who can set in play," said the Islanders coach. Burton is a versatile chap who can play any forward position.

It is likely that the Islanders will go with the same lineup that swamped Glace Bay Miners 10-2 here on Tuesday. Neither Gus Taitaverson nor Larry Backburn will be back to help out defensively.

Gustaverson is expected to be out for another day or two while Backburn will not be able to skate for at least a week. He received a kidney injury in the opening game a week ago.

In two games the Islanders and Millionaires have split honors. The Islanders defeated the Sydney crew 2-1 here while Sydney downed the local club 5-0 in the Steel City the following night.

There will be a few changes in the Millionaires lineup. Big Dunc MacIntyre will be making his appearance of the season here as will Joralee Cowan, a big forward who has played for the past four years with Regina St. Pats Juniors and Bill Matthews, a former professional performer.

The Millionaires also have a new

goalie in the person of Norman DeLifice. He was spare goalie for the Boston Bruins before Terry Reardon put in an emergency call to the Tea Party City.

Islanders May Affiliate With N.H.L. Team

The Islanders are in the process of becoming affiliated with a National Hockey League club, it was learned here last night from coach Wes Trainor.

If negotiations are carried through to completion Trainor will be appointed a scout for Maritime hockey talent. The deal would put the Islanders in line for players from the parent club's farm system.

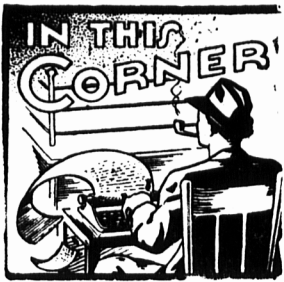

3-Year-Old Jupiter Wins Cambridgeshire Handicap

NEWMARKET, (AP)—Sir Gordon Richards booted home three-year-old Jupiter in the Cambridgeshire Handicap Stakes Wednesday for his first victory in 33 years in the classic horse race.

Richards sent the chestnut colt out in front 50 yards from the finish and stayed there to snatch a thrilling three-quarter-length victory from top-weight King of the Tudors, with Ken Gethin up.

Fair Colleen was third, a short head behind, ridden by jockey J. Sims.

An Irish hospital sweepstakes is based on the result of the race, which made up the second race of the traditional autumn betting double.

Richards' success followed his victory earlier this year when he won his first Derby aboard Pinza.

The spirit and hustle shown by the Islanders this season has been the subject of considerable admiration by the fans in attendance at the team's three home games. There is no question about it but that Trainor has the boys giving everything they've got and Tuesday night they had plenty against Glace Bay. Tonight's another question as they meet a much stiffer team in the Sydney Millionaires.

The Millionaires outplayed the Islanders while losing a 2-1 decision in the League opener a week ago. Since then they have been strengthened considerably with the addition of Dunc MacIntyre, Gordie Cowan and goalie Norman DeLifice. On the strength of this the Sydney crew should be favored to take the big one tonight but with second place at stake on the outcome of the game the Trainormen may again prove that they can't be beaten here.

The Islanders also have some good points in their favor. Their big line of Whitlock, Saindon and Gray is billing and right now is the hottest in the League. Trainor is stickhandling in his old time form as can be seen by the fact that he collected seven points Tuesday night. Bessette is back in nets and he is the toughest goaltender to beat in the Maritimes.

Toss the Islanders fighting spirit in there, weigh the respective merits of the two teams and the scales are about even. It should be quite a contest.

Tom Fyles paced Glace Bay with two goals, matching his previous night's performance against Charlottetown Islanders, and big Hugh Campbell got the other.
