THE END TO BE WORKED FOR Woodlots should be kept in a condition that will ensure the maximum yearly growth of the right kind of trees.

When the forest is young the growth rate is slow, but it increases as the trees mature. The rate of growth of a tree varies considerably during different periods of its life.

Table with 2 columns: Age (30 years old to 110 years old) and Volume (3 cords to 67 cords).

It will be noticed that it takes 30 years to produce two cords, whereas the volume is increased between 30 and 60 years, growth is rapid, and continues satisfactorily until 80 years is reached.

DIABETES

Wins Damages Against London Daily Mirror

LONDON, (Reuters)—Bolivian tin millionaire Ategor Patino Tuesday was awarded £13,000 damages with costs in a libel action he brought in the London high court against the mass-circulation Daily Mirror.

Patino, who lives in Paris, complained that an article in the newspaper had suggested that he insisted his son-in-law should be present when a son was born to his daughter, Christine.

The newspaper denied that the words were defamatory. It also pleaded that when the article was published it believed the facts to be true because they were received from and checked with people they regarded as trustworthy.

Summing up to the jury, Justice Sir Frederic Sellers explained that it was a case in which the jury could give damages of a punitive character.

"If newspapers do not conform to the recognized standards of a decent press, it may be that the only way to arrest their activity is by a monetary assessment against them," he said.

Statistics On Unemployment

OTTAWA, (CP)—More workers were claiming unemployment insurance at the end of 1954 than a year earlier. Those who were collecting insurance or who had applied for it at Dec. 31 numbered 431,770, the bureau of statistics reported Tuesday.

The Dec. 31 figures included 400,890 persons receiving or applying for normal benefits and 30,940 applicants for winter supplementary benefits. The comparable 1953 figures were 378,368 and 18,670.

The ordinary benefit figures compared with 374,462 a month before the year-end. Supplementaries do not go into effect before Jan. 1.

The year-end insurance figures were higher than a year earlier in all but three provinces. Dec. 31 figures, with those of Dec. 31, 1953, bracketed, include: Newfoundland, 10,597 (11,851); Prince Edward Island, 2,570 (2,561); Nova Scotia, 18,311 (17,926); New Brunswick, 18,157 (20,272); Quebec, 130,028 (136,428).

Benefit payments in December totalled \$19,428,000 for 6,190,000 days, against \$18,983,000 for 5,413,000 days in December, 1953.
