Canadian Radio Wins Ohio State University Awards

COLUMBUS, O., (CP) — The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation won seven first awards and three honorable mentions in the 18th American exhibition of educational radio and television programs sponsored by Ohio State University.

The awards will be made here in connection with the Annual Institute for Education by Radio-Television April 7 to 10.

The CBC won six firsts and three honorable mentions in group I, programs heard nationally by network or transcription.

One top award went to a western regional network program and two first awards and one honorable mention to private stations.

"Trans-Canada Matinee," carried on the CBC Trans-Canada network from CBL Toronto, received first award in class 1, directed to special-interest groups, for "providing women at home with a program of adult, serious radio fare."

In class 2, cultural drama, "CBC Wednesday Night" won first award for its "powerful and significant drama, superbly presented."

In class 4, public affairs, "Press Conference," originating at CBC Ottawa and carried on the CBC Dominion network, won first award.

Honorable mention went to "Travel Documentaries," carried on the Trans-Canada network from CBL Toronto.

Bible Presentation In class 6, special one-time broadcasts, first award went to "The Vigil," produced at CBM Montreal for the Trans-Canada network, for "presenting Bible facts in an accurate and appropriate and unusual setting of modern times with no loss of reverence or sense of sectarianism."

In class 7, children and youth out-of-school listening, "Roundabout," produced by CBU Vancouver for the Trans-Canada network won first award for "imaginative use of the documentary method of assisting the child to explore his world. . . CBC is to be once again congratulated for its purposeful approach to the whole field of superlative children's entertainment."

In the same class, a second top award went to "Cuckoo Clock House," carried on the Dominion network from CJBK Toronto.

In class 3, dealing with personal and social problems, "The Way of Children," produced by CJBK Toronto and carried on the Dominion network, won honorable mention.

In class 5, dealing with basic ducted; also some of the games played by the Cubs. This was all instructive as well as entertaining. There was a very good attendance.
