# Island Legion Cribbage Championships Slated

MONTAGUE — The Charlottetown branch, Royal Canadian Legion, will play host to the cribbage finals tonight. This tournament will decide the provincial championships and will include the winners from the legion zones from the three counties.

Two teams from each county will participate in this competition. The winner tonight will hold the trophy for one year unless such as in the case of the Rustico team which has won twice in succession, a win tonight will give it permanent possession.

The trophy will be presented following the play by J. Hamilton Douglas, Mount Stewart, provincial president.

These cribbage tournaments were started four years ago to help foster greater interest in the legion. Mr. Douglas suggested Friday evening at Montague that he was quite sure one of the reasons for new interest and new membership in the Montague branch were these play-offs.

A six per cent increase for 1963 membership is considered necessary to maintain a legion in the area. Assistance to such things as community projects and sports as well as to be able to carry on all its own activities.

A Dominion-wide drive is now on and to the end of February the Montague branch was leading all commands across Canada in percentage of new members taken into the legion.

P.E.I. has a potential of 5,853 members and has an actual membership as of the end of February of 3,052, or a percentage of 56.4 it was reported.

Each year there is a considerable loss of members due to deaths, illness and a drop off of members. It is expected that a P.E.I. command will lose approximately 1,680 in the next 10 years due to death alone.

April and May of this year are campaign membership months across Canada.
