

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## UNITED STATES.

**BRIDGEPORT, Conn. Sept. 30.**  
The wife of Rev. Mr. Lounsbury, who shot and killed her husband, was arraigned to day on Stratford on a new complaint; she pleaded "not guilty." She will be removed to jail here on Tuesday if the weather is favorable. The prisoner's physician thought she could not be moved without endangering her health. The prisoner grew hysterical at the sight of her little daughter, who has been adopted by an intimate friend of the deceased.

**SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.**  
Grant's reception of the public school children at Woodward's Garden, to-day, was the most enthusiastic ovation yet received. As the General appeared, deafening cheers greeted him, while from every part of the building bouquets rained on the stage. After a few minutes the enthusiastic youngsters were reduced to comparative quiet, when the President of the Board introduced Grant. Another uproarious outbreak of applause followed, after which the General addressed the audience. At least 30,000 children were present. At 1 o'clock the young legions were still marching past in review, with drums, banners, mottoes and flags while the General maintained his position and faced the constant fire of bouquets with his accustomed tenacity and pluck.

**BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 30.**  
Frank Edwards, of Corfu, Genesee county, accompanied by his wife and child, were overtaken by the storm of yesterday, and while seeking shelter beneath a large tree, Edwards and two horses attached to their carriage were instantly killed by lightning. The balance of the party were uninjured.

**CHICAGO, Sept. 30.**  
The roads leading east from this city have done an immense freight business during the past week in excess over the previous week amounting to 13,898 tons, the largest increase for one week made in several years. The cause of increase was the fight between the Bulls and Bears in the grain trade at Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York.

**NEW YORK, Sept. 30.**  
Madison Square garden was filled this evening on the occasion of the reception to Rowell. Exhibition walks were given by Rowell, Hazael, Guyon, Merrit, and Ennis. Rowell ran a mile in 5.27. A two mile walk for \$50, between Peter Crossland, England, and John Dobler, Chicago, was won by the latter, in 18.36.

At the conclusion of the exhibition, Rowell was presented with a large silver card receiver, accompanied with the usual congratulatory address.  
No presentation of the belt was made, that trophy, which was deposited at Tiffany's by Mr. Busby, Weston's agent, for safe keeping, having been attached in a suit by some of Weston's creditors. Rowell stated that he would at once take legal proceedings for its recovery.

**JAMESTOWN, Sept. 30.**  
Hanlan has taken quarters at Bemus Point until the week before the race, when he returns to Mayville. He took a spin this afternoon fourteen miles, which was witnessed by crowds. The training begins on Thursday. Courtney also gave an exhibition. The weather is fine; men in good spirits.

## GREAT BRITAIN.

**LONDON, Sept. 30.**  
After the Boyd-Higgins boat race yesterday, Elliott challenged Boyd to row for £200 a side. The offer was accepted.  
The man arrested last week for the \$20,000 forgery on Glynn, Mills & Co., bankers, has been identified as William Ringgold Cooper, an American, formerly in the United States navy. He swindled that department out of \$175,000, afterward became a daring and expert forger. He had been living at an elegant country seat near Herefordshire, hunting with the gentry, giving liberally to the poor, attending church, and meanwhile forging the names of his neighbors. His arrest led to the discovery of another forgery on the Bank of England, for which he will be arraigned.

## AUSTRIA.

**VIENNA, Sept. 30.**  
The suspension of Schild & Co., drapers, is reported, liabilities five hundred thousand florins. Several Paris and Lyons houses are among the creditors.  
Sieber & Jerabb, cotton merchants, have also failed, liabilities two hundred thousand florins. This effects parties in Manchester and Liverpool.

## GENERAL NEWS:

**ROME, Sept. 30.**  
Sicily and Southern Italy were visited by a great storm on Sunday, which carried away the railroad bridge between Ciro and Crucilo, hurling a passenger train into the torrent. The engineer was killed and all the passengers injured.

**GENEVA, Sept. 30.**  
The district of Leroche, Canton of Fribourg, was visited by a waterspout on Friday. Twelve bridges were destroyed, and houses, fields and vineyards were flooded.

**BERLIN, Sept. 30.**  
Eastern Siberia is menaced with famine. Grain is dearer than ever before, and the poor are suffering severely. The harvest was very bad.

MR. HOLLOWAY, the prince of English pill-makers, has devoted \$1,250,000 to the erection of a college for the higher education of women near London, and proposes to endow it with \$500,000 exclusive of some land, which will probably bring a great sum on building lease. His advertising has been at the rate of \$100,000 to \$150,000 a year for the last thirty years.

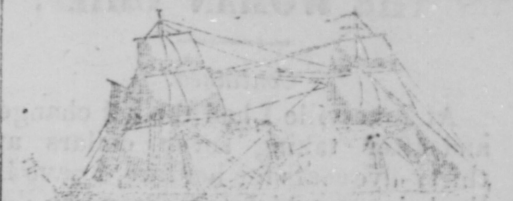
