

McNEILL HOUSE, QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY

University Honours Island Educationist

For the second time within the past decade Queen's University has seen fit to honour a native Islander.

William Everett McNeill, Ph. D., D.C.L., LL.D., F.R.C.S., a native of Lower Montague, vice-principal emeritus of Queen's University who for the past forty-six years has been one of the University's most devoted servants, had the honour of having the new building named after him.

Four years ago the University honoured Dr. McNeill when they named a Provincial Scholarship after him. The scholarship which is available to the highest ranking student of fourth year Prince of Wales College who is attending Queen's University for a substantial amount and has been of great assistance to Island students since it was first named.

McNeill House has 75 double rooms and 36 single rooms. The total cost of construction with furnishings was approximately \$800,000. It is U-shaped with the centre portion 162 feet long and the wings 87 feet in length.

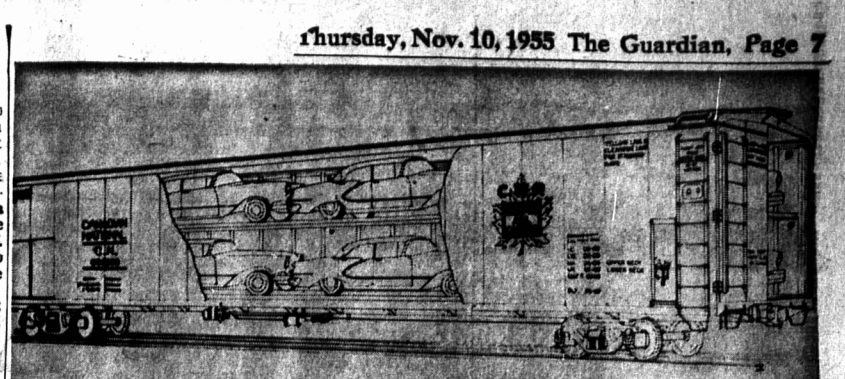

More Health Bursaries For PEI & Newfoundland

Ottawa.—Federal health grants for specialized training in occupational therapy and physiotherapy have been awarded to Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland, according to an announcement by Hon. Paul Martin, Federal Health Minister. In Prince Edward Island Bursaries totalling \$620, go to Valda Harris, Murray Harbour, P. E.I. and Mary Alice Chandler, Charlottetown. The two are taking a three-month course in occupational therapy at the Ontario Hospital in Kingston, Ontario. Upon completion of the course they will take positions as occupational therapy assistants in Falconwood Hospital. In Newfoundland, a federal health bursary of \$1,265, goes to Miss Marjorie Noworothy, Bishop's Falls, toward the first part of a three-year course in physiotherapy at McGill University. Commenting on the bursaries Mr. Martin noted that one of the great shortages in the mental health field is for occupational therapists. It was very gratifying, he said, to see that Prince Edward Island is joining several other provinces which are taking advantage of the Ontario mental health program for the training of occupational therapy assistants. The Ontario Program is carried on with assistance from federal mental health grants. Mr. Martin said the Newfoundland bursary would help alleviate the serious shortage of physiotherapy staff in that province and pave the way for improved facilities for medical rehabilitation.

Mission At New Glasgow

A remarkable spirit of Christian co-operation is being evidenced in the Preaching Mission being held Church. Three evenings of a church filled to the front seats despite rainy weather has been the response to the services in which hours from various churches have assisted. The Missioner is Rev. H. Bruce Stainton of Dartmouth who is Evangelist for the Maritime Christian Missionary Society. At the Sunday services the joint choirs of the United and Christian churches in New Glasgow sang at the 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. services. At the morning service they sang "Come Let us Sing of a Wonderful Love" and at the evening "Revive Us Again". Miss M.E. Campbell presided at the organ. On Monday night the Glasgow Rd. and Wheatley River Choirs, under the leadership of Mrs. Phillip Matheson, sang "I Will Sing of My Redeemer" and "I Surrendered All." On Tuesday evening the Trinity Eight with Mr. Royster Mugford leading, sang the Gospel songs in their inimitable manner. The minister of the church, Rev. Breyer Jones, has also arranged for the Kensington United Church Choir, the choir of Central Christian, Charlottetown and the choir of the Church of Christ, Summerside for the remainder of the week nights. On Sunday night at 7.30 p.m. the Cavendish Baptist and United Church choirs will sing and the Male Quartette will also share in the service. Evangelist Bruce Stainton has been leading the Hymn Service each night, the grand old Gospel hymns being used. Messages on the theme "We Would See Jesus" are being used with "Christ - the Lord", "Christ - the Saviour", "Christ the King" and "The Christ of the Cross" being the subjects for the concluding services each night at 8 p.m. except Saturday and Sunday at 11 a.m. and 7.30 p.m. The large crowds in attendance have testified to this spiritual treat in music and in message.

Dalhousie Pioneered The Teaching Of Common Law

The law School of Dalhousie University can claim unique distinction for two pioneering efforts, but its greatest endorsement, according to Dean Horace E. Read, Q.C., is the list of distinguished men who have taught and studied in the school since its founding in 1883. As part of the current Dalhousie University Expansion Appeal, the Law School seeks additional endowment to meet rising costs, to expand its facilities, to provide resources for scholarships and student loans. The first school in the British Commonwealth devoted to the teaching of the common law, Dalhousie was under the guidance of its first Dean, Dr. Richard Chapman Weldon. The original faculty included Benjamin Russell, later Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, who held an active professorship in the school until 1921; the Hon. J.S.D. Thompson, then a Judge of the Supreme Court and later Prime Minister of Canada; Wallace Graham, later Chief Justice of Nova Scotia; Robert Sedgewick, later a Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada; Hon. S. L. Shannon, John Y. Payzant, and James Thomson. Since then scores of lawyers and judges have given instruction in the school. The school pioneered again in 1950 when, with encouragement of the late Hon. J. Macdonald and co-operation of the Government of Nova Scotia, it established the Nova Scotia Legislative Research Centre, first of its kind in the world. The Research Centre is designed to provide students with experience in methods of legal research and of drafting effective legislation and to make the results of their work available to the Legislature. The unique opportunities afforded by the Research Centre have attracted graduate students for advanced studies, said Dean Read, one student having come from Pakistan. On Dean Weldon's retirement in 1914, Donald A. MacRae, whose death occurred recently in Toronto, was appointed as his successor. A graduate of Dalhousie, Dean MacRae had taught at Cornell and Princeton and, in 1955, was appointed to the staff of Osgoode Hall. John E. Read, a full-time member of the faculty was appointed Dean. He had been educated at Dalhousie, Columbia, and Oxford, and served as Dean until 1929 when appointed legal adviser to the Department of External Affairs.

Art Society Hear Interesting Talk On India

Members of the P. E. I. Art Society and others heard with great interest, Mr. D. Raja Gopal, as he spoke of his ancient civilizations and culture, in conjunction with other parts of the world, in the Club Room of the Civic Centre, last evening. Mr. Gopal told of the growth of India, emphasizing its basic traditions against war. He told of how would-be conquerors had come to India, only to become absorbed by means of India's great capacity for peace. "Only undeveloped countries," said Mr. Gopal, "are in a position to help solve the problems of the world, because they have no axe to grind." Mr. Gopal used traditional fables of his country along with his pen and ink illustrations to demonstrate universal truths. He deplored the fact that so many people in industrial countries realize no necessity for taking time off to relax and daydream. He also emphasized the necessity of an open mind, both of the individual and the country, a mind free to absorb the best of other countries have to offer. Then all shall be drawn together for universal peace. The regular business meeting was then held. The meeting adjourned for a social hour, during which lunch was served by hostesses, Mrs. Lewis Simmons, Mrs. D.M. Gass and Mrs. George DeBlois. All present are eagerly looking forward to the continuation early in December of this address by Mr. Gopal, journalist and lecturer.
