Great Financing.

(St. John Sun.)

The Finance Minister is able to congratulate the country that the rate of interest on the Canadian public debt continues to get lower. In ten years the net interest charge on loans negotiated in England has been reduced by three-eighths of one per cent. This is very well, but nothing to the saving that Mr. Fielding has made in the rate of interest on money borrowed through the savings banks. Three-eighths of one per cent. in ten years is fair progress, but it is nothing compared with the reduction of one per cent. which Mr. Fielding has accomplished in a year and a day on the rate paid to depositors in the savings banks. This shows how much easier it is to beat down the interest rate when the lender cannot help himself.

By reducing the rate in England a quarter of one per cent. Mr. Fielding saves \$10,000 a year on his ten million dollars loan. That is a good thing. But by reducing the savings bank rate one per cent. he saves \$44,660 a year in his borrowing from the people of St. John alone. The savings effected at the expense of the depositors at the Charlemagne are \$2,988 a year, while Dalhousie contributes by the reduction \$3,963; Fredericton \$6,932 and Newcastle \$2,451. Amherst receives \$2,941 less than it would at the old rate, and Charlottetown is short \$18,308 a year. There are no returns from the individual post-office savings banks, so that the full amount gained by the department from the people of this province cannot be ascertained. But the amount must be at least nine times the saving by the reduced interest on the London loan. The savings bank depositors are of course much pleased with the opportunity afforded them to help the government make money cheap.

Dock Extension at Liverpool.

Liverpool is determined not to lose her supremacy as a great shipping port if the expenditure of money and the making of business facilities will prevent it. There is now before the British House of Commons a bill to authorize the Mersey Dock and Harbor Board to expend \$17,810,000 in dock extension. The scheme contemplates the construction on the southern portion of the dock board's estate at Liverpool, of four new branch docks and two new graving docks, with a new deep water entrance to the existing Brunswick docks, and on the northern portion, two new branch docks and one graving dock, with improved entrances. The new docks are to be of sufficient length breadth and depth to accommodate the largest class of vessels building. Ten years are given for the completion of the works, but it is the intention of the Board to carry them out at the earliest possible moment.

THE BUDGET DEBATE.

A New Binder Twine Monopoly Which Has Raised The Price Ten Per Cent.

In the House of Commons on Friday last, Mr. Taylor, of Leeds, made a short and lively speech on the Budget, in which he proved by price lists that barbed wire and binder twine from which the duty was taken, were now sold higher than before by reason, in the case of twine, that the government had refused a tender from Coll Brothers, of St. John, for the purchase of a supply, accepting a lower price from Hobbs, who was a great politician of Ontario, and who was also agent of United States factories. This firm, having now a monopoly, had raised the price 10 per cent. over last year's prices, and far above the price at which the Coll Brothers could have sold if the contract had been given to them.

The discussion was continued by Frost, who expressed thanks as a business man that a better tariff policy had been introduced.

Dr. Sproule, who followed, pointed out that Frost's rejoicing was justified, as he was a bloated mowing machine maker, whose protection had been increased.

American Interests in China

Harpers Weekly: Since our last issue China has leased Wei-Hai-Wei to Great Britain, and that power occupies this important harbor on the same terms on which Russia occupies Port Arthur and Tientsin. Japan has, it is said, assented to this last lease, and so far as European powers are concerned, affairs in China seem to be in a better condition than they were. But as to China herself, it is evident that she is falling to pieces and is being divided, and our own interests there are great enough to warrant us in taking every measure in our power to maintain and promote the ascendancy of Great Britain. Her interests and ours are one, and if it be necessary to preserve those interests, the European powers should be made to understand that we regard the encroachments upon English rights as injuries to our interests.

CAPT. SIGSBEE OF THE MAINE

Capt. Sig-see of the destroyed battleship Maine is in Washington, and a correspondent there says: Capt. Sig-see has a desk in the ante-room of the office of the secretary of the navy, and is trying to catch up with his correspondence, but is not allowed to do much work during business hours. Everybody who comes to the department asks for him and he waits until a crowd accumulates in the reception room, when the messenger summons him and he shakes hands all around. The new library building was the chief object of interest in Washington until the explosion; now it is Capt. Sig-see. The captain is very good-natured about it, although it is a nuisance to shake hands with 1,000 or 1,500 strangers every day. The people are very much gratified.

DEFECTIVE TORPEDO BOAT.

United States War Vessels Return to Falmouth, England, in Distress.

FALMOUTH, Eng., April 18.—The United States cruiser Topeka, formerly the Doge, and the United States torpedo boat Somers, purchased for the United States in Germany, have sought shelter here. It is said that the crew of the Somers have again refused to continue the voyage in her, owing to unseaworthiness. They say that when she is at full speed her fore compartment is full of water. Later in the day it was announced that two new leaks had developed in the Somers, from defects in her machinery. She is now being docked for repairs.

UNITED STATES TRADE.

New York, April 18.—Bradstreet's reported on Saturday "Effects of the prevailing uncertainty in foreign affairs showed in a further perceptible quieting down of general trade, so far as future engagement are concerned, in nearly all parts of the country."


New York, April 16.—R. G. Dun & Co's weekly review of trade states that "Preparations for war continue as if it were inevitable. There is some hibernation of business and in the volume of payments through clearing houses is still 9.10 per cent. larger than last year, and outside New York about 2.2 per cent. New York banks may now realize that they are strong enough for all possible emergencies and may give the government valuable aid by greater freedom in business loans. Sound New York banks are not in the least alarmed about the business situation, nor have they any occasion for alarm."

FEAR OF WAR

The American line steamship City of Paris sailed from New York a few days ago, with only 25 cabin passengers. This is the fewest number the big liner has ever carried, but she took thirty extra firemen and stokers. Most of the voyagers were Europeans returning home. Captain Watkins said that fear of war was responsible for the falling off. "If war should be declared while we are at sea," he said "I don't think there is a cruiser in the Spanish navy that could overhaul the Paris. Her engines are now mangled by a force of sixty five men."
