**BIG PURSE FOR STALLIONS.**—D. H. Blanchard, of Boston, has decided to give a purse of \$10,000, open to all trotting stallions eligible to 2 1/2 cl. as, for a race to occur on September 13th, 1893, at Beacon Park. Mile heats, heat three in five, to harness. Purse to be divided: \$5,000 to first horse, \$3,500 to second, \$1,500 to third, \$1,000 to fourth. Entrance, ten per cent of purse, payable two per cent May 1st, two per cent June 1st, two per cent August 1st, two per cent September 1st. Mr. Blanchard was the donor of the great \$10,000 stake given September 15th, 1874, at Myrtle Park, which was won by Smuggler, and attracted the greatest crowd of people that ever paid admission to a trotting race. It is intended that the meeting now proposed shall be equally attractive.

**COTE ST. ANTOINE ACADEMY.**—The Montreal Witness says: The exercises in connection with the closing of Cote St. Antoine Academy for the holidays were held on Friday. A programme, consisting of patriotic songs and recitations was gone through, after which the pupils were addressed by the Rev. Messrs. McGillivray and Buehler; Messrs. Knowles, Walker and Dr. T. Wrasby Mills, all of whom expressed their pleasure with what they had seen, their satisfaction with the progress that had been made and the marked improvement in the general conduct of the school. **ANOTHER CHEESE FACTORY.**—A public meeting will be held in the Hall at Hunter River, on Wednesday, January 11th, at 7 o'clock, p. m., to consider matters relating to the establishment of a cheese factory. Farmers and others interested, from this and surrounding settlements, are respectfully requested to attend.

**WATER COMMISSIONER'S ELECTION.**—This is nomination day for the vacancy on the Board of Water Commissioners. The poll opened at twelve o'clock and will close at four this afternoon. Messrs. Thomas Campbell, Peter Halloran and J. H. Gates have nominated. Mr. Reddin has decided not to run.

**TURKEYS.**—Further consignments of Canadian turkeys have arrived in Liverpool by the Allan steamer Sardinian and the Cunard steamer Auraria. They number about 1,000 packages, and, with the consignment previously recorded, make a total of 100 tons of Canadian turkeys (about 21,000 birds) landed at this port during the past few days.—Liverpool Courier, Dec. 20.
