MONDAY

A retired Souris carpenter, Mr. Laughlin McInnis, 87, was fatally injured on the street near his home Saturday night when he was struck by a half-ton truck, driven by Dennis Mossman, also of Souris.

Mr. McInnis was returning from visiting a neighbor, Michael Lavin when he was struck on Main Street about 9:30. He passed away in Souris Hospital at 11:45.

His injuries were said to have included fractures of both legs. Mrs. L. H. Poole was elected president of the Montague Ladies Curling Club at their annual meeting held at the club room Saturday afternoon.

Fire of undetermined origin early last evening completely destroyed the dwelling of Mr. Percy Shaw, Canoe Cove. It was discovered about 6:30 and though a large group of neighbours quickly gathered the fire had made so much headway that nothing could be done.

Rev. D. A. Campbell of New London was the guest speaker at a special anniversary service in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church for Montague, last evening. The occasion, which marked an era of twenty-five years of worship in the present beautiful edifice, was one also of dedication.

It was learned over the week end that the bid placed by the town of Summerside with the Crown Assets Corporation for the purchase of the old post office building has not been accepted.

The investment of Right Rev. Patrick McMahon, D.D. as Domestic Prelate took place at an impressive ceremony last evening in St. Dunstan's Basilica. His Excellency Bishop James Boyle officiated in the presence of a very large congregation.

On entering the sanctuary His Excellency went to his throne. The Papal brief of appointment was then read in Latin and English by Rev. P. F. Macdonald, Chancellor of the Diocese.

Monsignor McMahon then went to the throne and was invested by Bishop Boyle with the insignia of his dignity, Rochet, Mantelletta and Biretta.

Mr. Frank McIntyre, President of the Holy Name Society, then read an address to Monsignor McMahon on behalf of the parishoners of St. Dunstan's parish, and a presentation was made by Mr. Joseph Callaghan.

TUESDAY

The Provincial Government has approved the sale of bonds for \$1,500,000 to A. E. Ames Company. The 4 1/4 per cent bonds, on a 15 year term, to be payable in 1967, were issued to pay capital charges on road construction.

The announcement of the issue was made yesterday by Hon. Walter E. Darby following a meeting of the Executive Council.

TO LOAD POTATOES - The M/V Jacob Kjode arrived yesterday in ballast from Harstad, Norway and is docked at the Railway wharf waiting instructions to load potatoes. The cargo will be destined to a port in the United States, probably Jacksonville, Florida.

PREMIER IN TORONTO - Hon. J. Walter Jones, Premier, has left en route to Toronto where he will attend the Royal Winter Fair now in progress. It is also expected that the Premier will pay a short visit to Ottawa.

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The Charlottetown Islanders moved to within three points of first place Halifax Athletics last night by turning back the Sydney Millionaires 1-0 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game that was featured by a battle of rival goaltenders.

The Islanders Al Millar, picked up his first shutout in the M. M. H. L. by turning aside 19 Sydney shots. It was Millar's first ap-

pearance here and although he was not given too much work he had to be good on a number of the drives that came his way.

The colorful Nick Pidsodny was tried 37 times and he beat the Islanders on 36 of their tries. Nick turned in one of his better games as he kicked out rubber from all angles, particularly in the third period when the Islanders rode in close for a dozen goal mouth tries.

Once again it was Roy (Buck) Whitlock, long the Maritimes most dangerous goal scorer, who provided Islanders with their victory margin. Buck combined with Gary Gordon and Bob Gray to notch the only counter of the game at the 15:25 mark.

Mr. Andrew Bain, French River, who won the Brehour Trophy for the best market Wiltshire side of bacon at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto, also had the signal honor of having his aged sow, Payndale Empress, place third in the breeding stock class.

It is the first-time Island swine have placed so high in the live classes despite their winning of the bacon and carcass classes so frequently.

WEDNESDAY

The recent bond issue approved this week by the Provincial Government, of \$1,500,000 was sold at a satisfactory price of 98.03, or on a cost to the Province basis of 4.43 per cent. It was purchased by a syndicate comprising A. T. Ames and Company, Wood Gundy Company, Dominion Securities Corp., Bank of Nova Scotia and Eastern Securities Ltd.

The urgent necessity of obtaining a new boat for the Wood Islands-Caribou run of the Northumberland Ferries Ltd. will be pointed up by a delegation from the local company which is leaving on Sunday to confer next week with the Canadian Maritime Commission in Ottawa.

In the group from here are Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Mr. A. H. Peake, Capt. C. R. Hunter and Mr. P. A. Lawrence.

Mr. and Mrs. Antoine Bernard yesterday celebrated their 62nd wedding anniversary at their home in Summerside. Friends and relatives gathered on Monday to celebrate the anniversary and to present to this grand old couple some very nice anniversary gifts.

HALIFAX, Nov. 18 - (CP) - Halifax Athletics hung on to first place in the Maritime Major Hockey League tonight with a 5-3 victory over Charlottetown Islanders.

An early third-period rally almost wiped out Athletics' lead until Bill Ford took a pass from Joe Lepine to clinch the scoring. The victory, which moved Halifax five points ahead of Summerside, was a result of a victory at Glace Bay brought Millionaires to within two points of Charlottetown.

Roland MacDonald was re-elected president of the Milk Producers and Vendors at their annual meeting held in the main office of the Experimental Farm last evening, over which he presided.

All the other officers and directors were also re-elected, including Major MacRae, vice president; Percy Gay, secretary-treasurer (for the 8th consecutive year), and the following other directors, Hon. Eugene Cullen, Leigh Kennedy, Neil Darrach and C. J. Wood.

A Department of Public Works truck, loaded with stakes, went over a high fill at Crockett's Hill on the Western Road near Alma, yesterday morning about eleven o'clock. The driver, Lorne Elvov of Wellington, was taken to the Western Hospital at Alberton suffering from concussion. Joseph Perry of Summerside, also in the truck, suffered a bruised arm.

The vehicle was badly damaged when the heavy load shifted forward buckling the cab and completely wrecking the running gear. Cause of the accident was not

known last evening. After treatment at the hospital at Alberton Barlow was removed to the Prince County Hospital at Summerside last night.

THURSDAY

Dr. L. W. Shaw returned on Monday after having attended two annual meetings dealing with education in the Maritime Provinces. At Fredericton the Central Advisory Committee on education assembled in the University of New Brunswick, where heads of universities and Department of Education heads met with teacher training leaders to discuss matters of common interest to the Atlantic Provinces.

Messrs S.H. Burhoe of Charlottetown and Frank Cameron of Summerside, delegate members of the P.E. Island Fisheries Federation to a meeting of the Fish Association in the Maritimes held at Moncton, N.B. on Tuesday, report a well attended and representative meeting at which definite overtures to the Federal Government were agreed upon.

SYDNEY, Nov. 19 - (CP) - President Art Lipton of the Sydney Hockey Club said tonight Millionaires will demand forfeiture of \$1,000 and two points for Charlottetown Islanders' failure to turn up for a scheduled Maritime Major Hockey League encounter here.

Millionaires based their demands on the grounds that Islanders "had not kept faith in making a 'fair try' to reach Sydney for tonight's contest."

Sterling Lutes of Charlottetown was taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital by ambulance this morning following an accident between a 1949 Dodge and a two-ton truck on the corner of Pownal and Kent Streets shortly after two o'clock.

The extent of Lutes' injuries were not immediately known. Lutes was driving for Town Taxi and was proceeding north on Pownal Street. The truck, driven by Joseph Anthony Comeau of Brookfield, was travelling east on Kent. Both vehicles were badly damaged.

A large and enthusiastic audience was present at the Prince of Wales College auditorium last evening to hear a very informal and enjoyable concert by the "Cabin Boys", four negro gentlemen, sponsored by the Centennial Y's Men of this city.

The four singers have been touring Canada, and in conjunction with their tour have been holding talent contests with a trip to Hollywood as prize. It was regretted by the local sponsors that applicants for the contest from this Province were reticent about competing, and so few were the entries that no competition was held last evening.

Many in this Province will be interested in learning that at the seventy-fifth anniversary convocation of the University of Manitoba, held recently in Winnipeg, the degree of Doctor of Laws, Honoris Causa, was conferred upon Colonel Arthur Sullivan, Q.C.

Colonel Sullivan is the son of the late Sir William W. Sullivan, for many years Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island. Mrs. W.L. Scott, of Ottawa, Mrs. William Sullivan of St. Catharines, Ont., and Mrs. Edward McManus of Memramcook, are sisters.

The preliminary hearing of John K. MacDonald on a charge of manslaughter in the death of Basil Beaton on October 29, was adjourned to Wednesday, November 26. The hearing, before King's County Magistrate Joseph MacDonald, opened yesterday morning in the Court House, Georgetown.

At the conclusion of his testimony Magistrate MacDonald then adjourned the hearing to next Wednesday, November 26. Appearing with Mr. McPhee for the defence is Mr. Malcolm MacKinnon while the Crown is represented by Mr. S. S. Hession, Q.C.

Speaking last night at the annual meeting of the Fifth Progressive Conservative district of Prince, held in the party headquarters in Summerside, Mr. R. R. Bell, provincial leader of the party pledged himself and his party to conduct the next federal and provincial election strictly according to the election act. He said he felt that the people of this Province have come to the stage where they definitely demand that elections be run according to the act and that he and his party would have no part in the prevalent practices of the past, the corruption, and the buying of votes by any manner or means.
