News has been received here from Alexandria, reporting that Arabi denies that he wrote any letters of any kind to Mr. Gladstone, and says that he had no political communications with the Sultan during the campaign.

It is reported here that the Imperial Government have offered Sir Selby Smyth the Governorship of Newfoundland, for the unexpired term of the present Governor, who wishes to retire in consequence of ill-health.

[Sir Selby Smyth was Commandant of the Militia of the Dominion, preceding Major-General Luird. Sir Selby Smyth, during his residence in Canada, did much to improve the militia force, and became very popular with the volunteers and the people at large.

Patrick Walsh was hanged at Galway this morning for the murder of Martin Lyden. Walsh protested his innocence to the last.

AN EXHIBITION BURNED.

Damietta Surrendered.

Terrible Accident.

Shot by Black Lizzie.

[Received just before going to press.]

The Times' Cairo despatch says Abdallah Pacha's negotiations for surrender of Damietta seems to be to gain time.

LATER—The News says Abdallah is willing now to surrender.

STILL LATER—A despatch from Alexandria, dated Friday night, says Damietta has surrendered.

All the rebel officers below the rank of colonel, confined to Ramleh, have been released. Fifty remaining prisoners have been brought here.

A terrible accident occurred at 9.10 this morning, in fifth avenue tunnel. The New Haven train while standing in the south-bound side was run into by the Harlem bound, demolishing cars, killing four, and injuring fifteen persons, some fatally.

Patrick Farrell, an English sailor, was fatally shot by a woman known as Black Lizzie, at a den known as "The Raven's Nest," on the Eras d'or road, near North Sydney, C. B., last night.
