WILLIAM B. MILLS
When on November 30, 1954, William B. Mills of Salford, Hope, passed to his eternal home, Prince Edward Island, lost one of its leading citizens. His farm and his buildings are models of neatness and his fields show the effects of good farming methods.
He was a son of James Mills and his wife Elizabeth Jenkins. His mother died several years ago, but his father is still living at the advanced age of 102 years. The late Mr. Mills was married to Pearl MacFarlane who survives him. To them were born three children: James, deceased; Lyle, now Mrs. Lloyd MacEwen of Rollo Bay, and Arnold who lives with his mother and his aged grandfather on the homestead. One brother, Joseph, in California; one sister, Susan, now Mrs. Harry Burke, Bay Fortune; three nieces: Clara, Mrs. Jocelyn Coffin; Minnie, Mrs. Ivan Jenkins; Stella, Mrs. MacEwen; also four grandchildren, Edna, Doris, Billy and also Dwight, all children of his daughter, Mrs. Lyle MacEwen, also survive him.
The late Mr. Mills was in his 65th year when he died. He was a loving husband and fond father, and he provided for his own aged father's comfort with care. He was ever a faithful friend and a generous neighbour whose obliging ways endeared him to many.
His funeral was a large one. The Reverend Donald McClure conducted the funeral services. The hymns sung were: "Jesus Keep Me Near The Cross" and "Nearer My God To Thee". Mrs. McClure sang as a solo "God Will Take Care Of You". Mrs. Clinton Stewart was organist.

SHIPPING RECORD SET

Reserve Of Gold, Dollars Higher

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canada's official reserves of gold and United States dollars climbed to a new high of \$1,942,600,000 on Dec. 31. A bank of Canada monthly report showed the reserves, used to help influence the international exchange rate of the Canadian dollar, increased by \$21,100,000 in the month and by \$124,100,000 in the year.
The value of gold holdings increased to \$1,072,700,000 on Dec. 31 from \$1,065,800,000 on Nov. 30 and \$986,100,000 on Dec. 31, 1953. Holdings of U.S. dollars rose to \$869,100,000 from \$855,700,000 in November and \$832,400,000 in the previous year.
