## Police Court.

OCTOBER 31.—John Wood, for assault and trespass on John Trenaman, Esq., while in the discharge of his duty as a County Magistrate, on the 26th September last, endeavoring to quell a riot on board the Ferry Steamer. Convicted. Fined 40s., with costs, or be imprisoned 6 weeks for the assault, and fined 10s., with costs, or be imprisoned 14 days for the trespass. Paid in Court.

5th.—Thomas Connors, drunk, disorderly and insulting Police Constables. Convicted. Fined 5s., with costs, or be imprisoned 48 hours, and ordered to give bail in £20, and two sureties in £10, each to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for 3 months, and stand committed till such security be given.
