# Hard-Luck Braves Lose Logan White Downing Chicago Cubs

The hard-luck Milwaukee Braves, still clinging to their slim one-game lead in the National League, suffered another crippling blow Sunday when shortstop Johnny Logan's right ankle was severely slashed while they were edging Chicago Cubs, 2-1.

Logan, already out a week this month because of a pulled thigh muscle, was spiked by Chicago pitcher Dave Hillman in the third inning during an attempted pick-off play. He probably will be sidelined a week to 10 days.

The Braves already have three men on the disabled list - Red Schoendienst, Del Rice and Eddie Haas. Ace pitcher Bob Buhl also is out indefinitely with an ailing shoulder.

**RAY OF HOPE**  
The one ray of hope in the dark clouds that hung over County Stadium in Milwaukee was the performance of pitcher Juan Pizarro, who was recalled from Louisville only five days ago. Except for the fourth inning he held the Cubs completely in check.

Los Angeles Dodgers, one game back, and San Francisco Giants, two off the pace, kept within breathing distance of the Braves by winning. The Dodgers ran their streak to seven by beating Pittsburgh 9-4, while the Giants licked Philadelphia Phillies 6-0, behind Johnny Antonelli.

St. Louis Cardinals swept a doubleheader with Cincinnati Reds, 9-7, 11-8 in other National League action.

In the American League race, which is equally tight, Cleveland Indians maintained their one-game margin over Chicago White Sox with a double victory over Boston Red Sox, 5-4, 1-0. The White Sox dropped New York Yankees back into the second division with two victories, 9-2, 4-2.

**WIN, BUT LOSE GROUND**  
Detroit Tigers knocked off Baltimore Orioles, 7-2, but lost a half game to the leaders and now stand 3 1/2 games back. Washington Senators defeated Kansas City A's, 7-3, in the other American League game.

Pizarro doled out five hits to the Cubs in Milwaukee's triumph. Eddie Mathews hit a homer for Sunday night. Victory Lind pushed ahead on the last strike to win by a head from Corsican, who set the previous mark of 2:01.45 last year at Roosevelt Raceway.

# Alfred Groom Tops Vaulters

**ST. LAMBERT, Que. (CP)**—Bill Macfarlane, the Montreal Olympic Club's sensational 18-year-old young runner, wound up a record-breaking performance Saturday at the St. Lambert Legion's annual track and field championships to become the outstanding athlete of the two-day meet.

On top of his record win in the junior mile Friday, Macfarlane romped off Saturday with the junior 800-yard run and the junior two-mile run in another record-shattering show that wiped out provincial open and native marks.

# Rematch Slated For September

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The sports world paid homage to Ingemar Johansson during the weekend while promoter Bill Rosenzohn, a \$40,000 loser, planned a \$1,000,000-plus rematch for September.

The handsome 26-year-old Swede looked ahead to a rosy future, strewn with dollar bills, after stopping Floyd Patterson with his "thunder and lightning" right hand in 2:03 of the third round Friday night at Yankee Stadium. The mystery right he hid in training now rules the heavyweight division.

Rosenzohn said Saturday he would take a vacation before getting down to serious work on the rematch. As he holds an iron-clad contract for the fight, he can afford to wait. The promoter said he will not start talking date, or site until July 20.

"I have the contract, calling for a rematch in 90 days," he said. "The site is to be in the United States with the city to be determined by me. Johansson's entire purse will be held in escrow until the rematch under terms of the contract."

**\$100 SEATS HELPED**  
Rosenzohn revealed a gross gate of \$470,712 and explained that the \$100 tops made this amount possible. As the promoter got half of the net gate or \$203,500 (half of \$407,130) and his expenses ran to about \$245,000, he lost a little over \$40,000. He did not share in the theatre-TV-radio-movie money.

Johansson was swamped with offers from all sides, including Hollywood. Cables from all points of the globe included one from Prime Minister Tage Erlander of Sweden, whose government wants to outlaw boxing. The prime minister wired, "best wishes to your well earned victory." Prince Bertil of Sweden also cabled "fantastic congratulations" to the fighter who floored Patterson seven times.

As for the rematch, Johansson said he was not sure it would be held in 90 days because "I think Patterson will need more time."
