

# Summerside Aces Defeat BYC 8-6 In Island League

The Summerside Aces scored six goals in the first two periods of play and held off a determined B.Y.C. bid in the last half of the third period to take home an 8-6 victory over the youth clubbers in an Island Senior League game at the Sports Arena last night.

# Landy Lets World Know He's On Comeback Trail

LONDON (AP)—John Landy has let the athletic world know that he is coming back.

The temperamental Australian teacher gave every indication he was through with track and field after a dismal season a year ago.

Now—on the basis of his first race Wednesday—he appears on the road to an athletic feat perhaps more remarkable than his world record of three minutes and 58 seconds for the mile.

The 28-year-old Landy may yet achieve a comeback that could carry him to an Olympic title in the 1,500 metres (metric mile) in Melbourne this year.

and was clocked in one minute, 51.8 seconds.

That's not especially fast. But Landy who is not a half miler, as are other top notch milers, but a runner whose forte is seven-time running. Also, it was his first race since his latest "retirement" more than a year ago.

### GOOD AS EVER

The crowd at Melbourne went home convinced Landy is as good as ever.

Landy, always one to see his efforts in the darkest light, was able to say he had run "better than expected." He said he anticipated a slower time.

"Now I don't want to race again for several weeks," added Landy. "But I have a better idea where I stand. With my temperament, I must think I really worth while I am to keep training."

That would indicate Landy is ready to work hard. Great miles with stamina must develop speed and more speed. Landy already is faster without much training than he was at his peak when he ran 3:58.

He failed to qualify in his heat at Helsinki in 1952 and lost Roger Bannister of Britain in the 1954 Empire Games at Vancouver in "the mile of the century."

## In This Corner

### No Financial Blues For Island League Heads

We think one of the most important aspects of the Island Senior Hockey League is its financial stability. Up to the moment there hasn't been a full house at any game, however, both the management of the Sports Arena and the various clubs involved have been most happy with the financial returns. No one is making a great deal of money on the league. In fact, no one really makes any money at all.

The management of the Aces, the Civic Stadium in Summerside and the Montague rink would like to see a packed house every night but as far as the players and the team sponsors are concerned they are quite content if they break even on the deal and in our Island League where there are no big salaries to pay and no great distances to travel, this isn't too hard a feat to accomplish.

All of this leaves us with the thought that perhaps these smaller hockey centres would be much better off if they did not try to support a pseudo-amateur team, and instead, enlist its hockey players from the ranks of its home brewers. The quality of the hockey suffers but does anyone really care? We have had it clearly demonstrated time and again in the Island League that exciting fast hockey has little bearing on whether the teams involved are amateur or professional or whether players are just one step below N. H. L. standards.

If cities like Halifax, Moncton, Sydney and St. John can't support a professional squad what hope have small towns like Fredericton and Charlottetown got? Practically none at all. It's very true that like Baltimore with the Orioles and Milwaukee with the Braves a town will treat newly acquired big league talent like all-conquering heroes if only because of the novelty of the thing and will support them for a time at least out of civic pride but that happens when John Doe decides that he will watch television and only go to one game per week instead of his usual two or three? Small towns trying to act like big league cities find that they haven't anyone around to take John Doe's place at the games and have an empty seat on their hands. Multiply John Doe by a thousand or two and you have a very good reason why small towns have no business getting into a big league business.

Of course dropping attendances cannot all be explained in such a simple manner as pointing to the population of a town. But we feel that it is certainly one of the reasons why major hockey was a decided flop in Charlottetown and why it is likely seeing its last days in Fredericton.

Meanwhile practically in every hockey spot in the world, the executives of hockey teams are yelling the "financial blues", a dirge that became increasingly popular after sports fever levelled off somewhat in the years following the end of World War 2. In the Maritime teams in Sydney, Gloucester, Charlottetown, St. John, Halifax and a few other places collapsed with a thump and this season it looks as if Fredericton, St. John (for the second time) and Moncton (for the second time) will join them.

When he was home for the holidays Buddy Dowling was telling us that a fabulous total of something like 250 persons turned up for one of Bridgewater's home games. We have yet to see any of our Island League games and team heads have no high salaries to pay either. Crowds at the Sports Arena have been over 400 consistently and have gone as high as 700 and up in Summerside where Aces drew in close to 2000 fans in their first two home games.
