ARTILLERY INSPECTION.

Lieut.-Colonel Wilson Expresses His Approval of the Work.

Yesterday was inspection day for No. 1 and 2 companies of the 4th Prince Edward Island, Canadian Artillery. The day was all that could be desired, and many citizens, among whom we noticed a goodly representation of ladies, were attracted to Victoria Park. His Honor Lieut.-Governor Howlan, who never fails to show the kind interest he takes in our militia force, was also upon the field. These two fine companies hold a warm place in the affection of our citizens, who regard them as being always prepared to acquit themselves in such a manner as to attract those who take an interest in military matters—and where is the genuine Anglo-Saxon that does not?—and those who attended on this occasion were not disappointed.

Shortly before 3 o'clock the two companies, headed by their fine band, marched from the drill shed to the Park, and at precisely 3 o'clock received the inspecting officer, Lieut.-Colonel Wilson, Royal Canadian Artillery, with a royal salute. The inspecting officer, accompanied by Lieut.-Colonel Moore, D.O.B., then passed along the ranks, making a close inspection of clothing and accoutrements, which were found to be in good order and well fitted. The corps then marched past in column by the right, and then in quarter column by the left. These movements were exceedingly well executed, the marching being particularly good. Live was again formed on the original ground and was advanced in order. Under command of their respective captains the companies were put through the various company movements and through manual and firing exercises by their subalterns. This part of the inspection showed the very careful training which the men had undergone, all the movements being performed in a manner worthy of regular troops.

At the conclusion of the inspection on the field, the inspecting officer addressed the officers, non-commissioned officers and men, complimenting them on the very creditable inspection they had passed, stating that in his district which extended from Montreal on the west to Nova Scotia on the east, he had never met as efficient a corps as the 4th regiment, that they were a credit to the province and to their commanding officer. Colonel Wilson stated that he was not in the habit of bestowing praise on such occasions, but was so delighted with the manner in which their work had been performed that he could not but express to them his gratification.

The men were then marched to the Drill Shed where they were inspected in artillery drill. Each company furnished two detachments on 64-pounder, R M L, and two on 40-pounder, R B L guns. Here the men again fully sustained their reputation as efficient artillerymen, their work calling forth many encomiums from the inspector.

It must have been highly gratifying to Lieut.-Colonel Moore, D.O.C., to find the old regiment which he formerly commanded sustaining its reputation as one of the most efficient in Canada, and Lieut Colonel Longworth has reason to be proud of commanding such a fine corps. Captains Davison and Moore, with their officers, deserve all the praise they received for the really excellent work performed by the men under their command. When all do so well we dare not make invidious comparisons, yet we must say the work done by No 1 Company upon the field yesterday was the finest exhibition of drill ever given in this province.

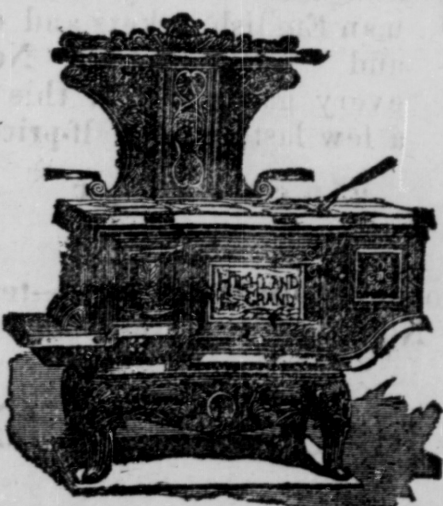

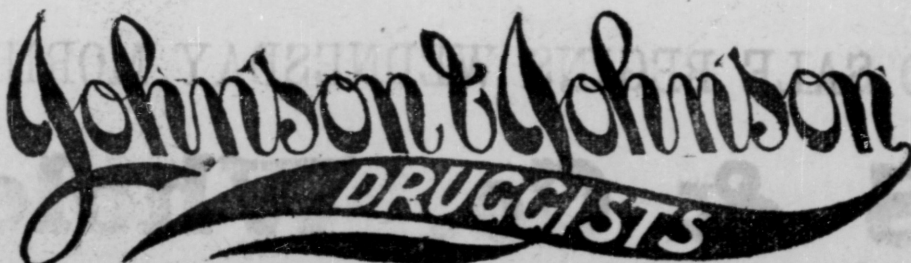
