How Can I...?

Canadian Consumers News

What Is The Canadian Association Of Consumers?

Just over four years ago representatives from all the then National Women's Organizations in Canada met together to consider whether it was advisable to promote in peace time, a Consumers' Organization to perform some of the functions which had been provided through the Consumer Branch of the W.P.T.B., which was disbanded in 1947.

The premise on which this new Association was formed, was that it was not to be an additional organization but to act as the economic wing for these bodies.

This programme the C.A.C. has been following and today it is now regarded as the largest and most representative Consumer Organization in Canada - its membership is entirely voluntary, non-sectarian, non-political, and is open to any woman living in Canada on the payment of an annual fee of 50 cents.

The C.A.C. has branches in nine of the Provinces of Canada (Newfoundland has not as yet been organized). Mrs. J.A. Lawson, Charlottetown, has recently been appointed Prov. President for P.E.I., and asks that any group or individual would contact her.

Statement Of Principles

The Canadian Association of Consumers was created to serve as a voice for the consumer. This consumer includes all groups and classes in Canada and cannot be represented fairly by lending C.A.C.'s voice to the service of any one group alone.

Everyone in Canada finds his interests in one direction served by higher prices for what he sells. In another by lower prices for what he buys. There are many organized groups in Canada seeking to serve the interests of their members.
