FRUIT-GROWERS' ASSOCIATION.

Directors' Meeting.
The Board of Directors of the Fruit-Growers' Association of Prince Edward Island met in the offices of the Agricultural Assurance Company, Summerside, on Thursday, the 1st inst., the President, W. H. A. Stewart in the chair.
The treasurer, Mr. Joseph Wise, M. L. A., presented a number of bills all but one of which were certified by the president and referred to be paid. Owing to the difficulty of convening the Board for the passing of bills as required by the constitution, the President's order on the Treasurer for bills of current expenditure was agreed upon as valid. Subscriptions for fifty-three members were forwarded to the Canadian Horticulturist, and any member of the Association who has paid in his annual fee of one dollar and who does not receive his Horticulturist, is requested to communicate the irregularity at once to the Board.
The annual report of the Association was submitted by the publication committee and approved. It is hoped that it will shortly be ready for distribution to the membership.
Mr. John Johnston from the committee appointed to wait on the government in regard to the

PERMANENT EXHIBIT
of fruit, reported that they had seen the Premier who promised that the government would defray the expenses of such exhibit. It will consequently be commenced with the ripening of our first fruit next season.
Mr. J. C. Clark was named to secure through Mr. Patriquin, of Wolfville, N. S., a number of scions of the Gravensteins, Stark, Blenheim, Bethel, and Spy varieties. Rev. A. E. Burke was asked to secure a number of scions of the Ontario Red and McIntosh Red varieties from Mr. Woolverton, Ontario, and Mr. D. A. Sharp agreed to secure a quantity of Alexander scions for the Association here. Parties requiring scions of any of those varieties at a nominal cost are requested to send in their orders as to quantity and variety as soon as possible to Mr. J. C. Clark, Bay View.

The President was appointed to call upon the Condensed Milk Company of Charlottetown and endeavor to induce them to take up the preserving of small fruits, etc., for the incoming season.
Mr. D. A. Sharp agreed to take up the fruit-shipment industry at the invitation of the association, and felt that our early varieties of apples could be made to pay well for dried apples.
The Board approved of the suggestion made to hold local meetings in the interests of horticulture, under the presidency of the district director, all over the province. A committee composed of Messrs. C. R. Dickey, John Johnston and Rev. A. E. Burke, was struck to take this matter in hand.

Moved by John Johnston and seconded by A. K. Henry, and—
Resolved that the Fruit Growers Association of Prince Edward Island do respectfully recommend to the Honorable, the Minister of Agriculture of Canada and the Premier of the Province, the peculiar fitness of Mr. J. C. Clark, B. A., of Bayview, to be assistant to the Exhibition Commissioner at Paris for this province. Carried.
A communication was read from the Minister of Agriculture of Ontario showing that instead of \$10,000 as stated in the Association report contributed by the government of that province to horticulture, \$40,523.93 was paid last year, and \$210,923.08 was spent on agricultural grants generally. It was decided to request the Provincial Government to restore and increase the annual grant to the Association.
After the transaction of other routine business the meeting adjourned *sine die*.

RAILROAD MILEAGE.—The figures that are at hand showing the railroad mileage in the world at the end of 1897 gives one a vivid impression of the tremendous stride of modern civilization the world over. The total was 457,659 3-8 miles; an increase over the mileage at the end of 1893 of 37,000 miles. North and South America had 237,740 miles, an increase of 12,000 miles in four years; Europe had 144,465 5-8 miles, an increase of 7,300; Africa, 9,967 1/2 miles, an increase of 2,200 miles; and Australasia had 14,383 1/2 miles, an increase of 1,600 miles. United States leads all nations, with 185,465 5-8 miles; Germany leads the European nations, with 30,072 1-2; Argentina is the heaviest railroad owner in South America, with 9,482 1-2 miles; British India, with 31,137 1-2 miles, has the greatest share of Asiatic roads, and the African roads, widely scattered, are mostly around the Mediterranean Coast and the Southern tip of the continent. Victoria has the most miles of track in Australia.

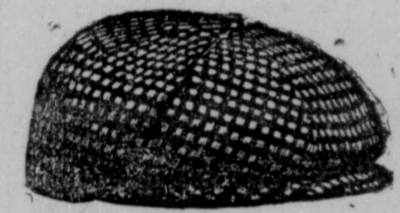
