LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Letter from Rev. D. McNeill.

SIR.—A further statement of the point at issue between myself and Mr. Moore, in regard to his letter would, I fear, prove uninteresting to the public. I must, therefore, forego the pleasure of substantiating them at greater length. The public have his statements, with his affirmations and denials, and my comments: let them pass judgment.

His several unsupported assertions in regard to the Scott Act need not receive any attention from me. They are stale stock-in-trade. But so long as a majority of the citizens of Charlottetown sustain the Scott Act, it is only Mr. Moore against the majority of citizens. Let him settle his accounts with them. They will be able to give him his due.

I would here bid adieu to Mr. Moore, but for some new matter he has needlessly introduced. He says: "It is all very well to set up as a defender of the rights of desolate families, &c., but I would like to know what share in the blame for those sad things is to fall on the shoulders of the men who brought in the Scott Act." If Mr. Moore does not know this, I cannot help him; for I do not believe any of the blame is really chargeable to the Scott Act men. If he has evidence to justify his assumption, let him produce it.

As to his dark hints about Scott Act men having "their collars full of liquor," they are unworthy of belief without evidence. I am quite willing he should search my cellar and every room on my premises for the contraband stuff, and publish to the world what he finds. I venture to say, his charges against other supporters of the act will be found no better established.

One word more about the "mistaken calling." I regret very much the way he has interpreted that expression. My reference was to another and different person and calling from his. His name is nearly identical with that of his respected father, whom I took to be the author of the offending letter. As it is, I have great pleasure in withdrawing that expression. I know nothing about the young gentleman's business capacity, and have no wish to detract from his prosperity or usefulness. He is a young man in the beginning of his career, and may yet modify his opinions of the Scott Act. In any case he should receive no attention from me but for the fact of his identity having been mistaken for that of his respected father.

Steam on the Montague.

DEAR SIR.—The steamer Eldon, purchased some time ago, arrived here this evening from Pinette, having made the passage in six hours. With the exception of one or two selfish soreheads, who are the enemies to all progress, the citizens turned out en masse to welcome the first steamer owned in Montague. This is the beginning of an enterprise which, if patronized, will be an advantage to the trade of this place; and, if successful, the company will place a much larger boat on the route. Her freight capacity is about two hundred barrels bulk, and she can accommodate twenty passengers, has good towing power, and will supply a much needed want on the Montague river, especially in the shipping season. She is intended to run as a packet between Gergetown, Montague and Grand River, touching at Annandale, with the object of increasing and facilitating the trade of a large section that has hitherto had no advantages and no inducements to increase and market their summer products.

It is a well known fact that to commerce we owe the greatest steps in human improvement; to the commercial city of Tyre we owe the invention of letters; and to-day the energy of British commerce is spreading the wonders of art and the blessings of Christian civilization. In the words of Sir Robert Peel, "The steam engine and the railroad are not merely facilitating the transport of merchandise, they are not merely shortening the duration of journeys for administering to the supply of physical wants,—they are speeding the intercourse between mind and mind, they are creating new demands for knowledge; they are fertilizing the intellectual as well as the material waste, they are removing the impediments which obscurity, remoteness or poverty may have heretofore opposed to the energy of a real merit."

New Fish Warden.

SIR.—At present there are several vacancies in the fisheries service of the island which will, no doubt, soon be filled. Additional wardens are also required in some localities.

In filling the vacancies, and in making the new appointments, I would suggest that men be appointed for the season only. This is the practice in Ontario, and gives good satisfaction there. Let the wardens be appointed annually and paid for their services during the fishing season. The same individual need not necessarily be appointed from year to year, although if found to be faithful and painstaking in the discharge of his duties he might be re-appointed.

I throw out this hint to the powers that be, in the hope that it may be favorably considered when next appointments are being made.

News Notes.

There is a deficit in the Italian budget of 35,000,000 lire.

Enia Pasha has left Zanzibar for the interior with 600 porters, five German officers and a large body of Nubian soldiers.

Mr. George Augustus Sala has been awarded £5,000 in his suit for libel against Mr. Furnias, the caricaturist, in London.

Rio Janeiro advices announce the establishment of a rigid censorship of the press in such matters as would unjustly work injury to the government.

The Sultan has dismissed a swarm of palace spies, thus saving £10,000 annually, and will reorganize the intelligence department on a better footing.

The Pope announces that at the coming-consistory, in accordance with the agreement with General Simmons, he will raise the Bishop of Malta to the rank of Archbishop.

The transportation of merchandise from eastern Canada to British Columbia in bond through United States territory is now allowed by order of the treasury department at Washington.

A Buenos Ayres despatch says it is announced that an English syndicate has purchased the Western Railway for \$41,000,000 gold. This leaves Buenos Ayres a surplus of \$16,000,000.

Live stock reports show that the farmers of Ontario are getting high prices for their cattle and that an active local trade is doing. The export trade opens this week, and promises to be a lively one.

The Paris *Elysee* declares that Emperor William is preparing to submit to President Carnot proposals for a rapprochement, which would have been impossible while Bismarck was in power.
