

Argonauts Dump Shearwater 54-0

TORONTO (CP) — East York Argonauts warmed up for the Canadian senior football final with a convincing 54-0 triumph over Shearwater Navy of Halifax in the Eastern Canada championship Saturday.

The victory—East York's 40th in 41 starts during the last three seasons—sends the Toronto club into the Canadian final in Winnipeg against Winnipeg St. James Rams. The Argos will be gunning for their third consecutive national title.

It was evident almost from the first play of the game that the Argos were in for another easy afternoon. The Shearwater crew was big but could offer little opposition to the Toronto powerhouse.

The first time Argos had their hands on the ball they scored a touchdown—and little more than midway through the first quarter they led 13-0. At half-time the score was 26-0 and it was plain that Shearwater would have trouble getting on the scoreboard.

Halfbacks Ray Williams, who led East York in scoring this season, and Gerry Burrows, for-

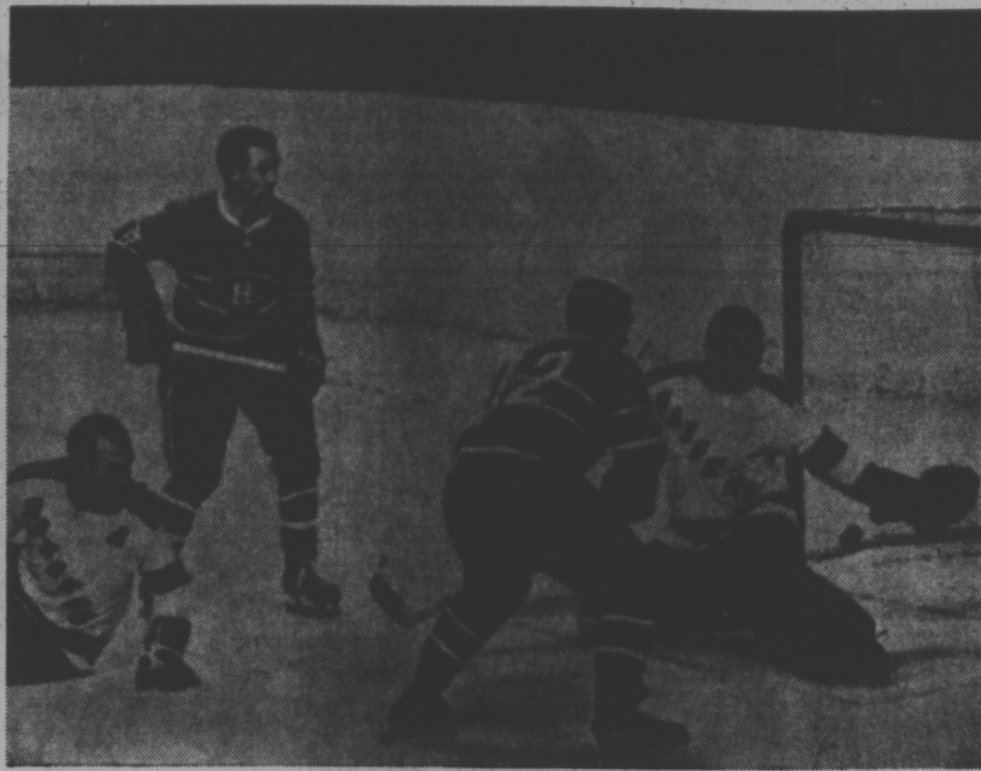
merly with Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Western Football Conference, paced East York with two touchdowns each.

Burrows scored on runs of one and 15 yards, while Williams, a doubtful starter because of an injury, caught a 46-yard pass for one touchdown and plunged a yard for the other.

Quarterback Gord McTaggart bulled four yards and halfback Ian Monteith three yards, while ends Lou Mazzocato and Don Kopplin caught passes of 16 and 23 yards to account for the other touchdowns.

Halfback Jim Walker rounded out scoring by kicking two converts, a 41-yard field goal and a 22-yard single.

The teams struggled in a sea of mud that resulted from a week-long steady rain, but the Argos found steadier footing and rushed for 258 yards against Shearwater's 103.

Canada's George Knudson Wins Canada Cup Classic

TOKYO (AP)—George Knudson of Toronto, Canada's most successful professional golfer, added another laurel to his crown Sunday when he captured individual honors in the Canada Cup classic.

The 29-year-old Winnipeg native defeated Hideyo Sugimoto of Japan in a sudden-death playoff with a birdie deuce on the second hole.

Knudson and Sugimoto had finished the tournament in the rain tied at 172, 16 strokes under par. That left them one stroke ahead of American Jack Nicklaus, who had surged from six strokes behind to pull even with the leaders on the 13th, but lost out with a disastrous two-over-par on the par-three, 177-yard 15th.

The irresistible U.S. combination of Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer won the team trophy with a score of 548, 28 strokes under par. They also had won team honors together in 1963 and 1964.

Canada finished sixth in the team competition with a total of 563. Knudson and his partner, 34-year-old Frank Fowler of Calgary, fired rounds of 194-144-139-145—566.

Their over-all individual performances were: Knudson 64-68-66-74—272 and Fowler 70-78-70-70—288.

73-72—291. Fowler placed far down in the individuals' final listing.

Knudson's individual victory was worth \$1,000. He became Canada's biggest pro golf money earner in history last year by winning more than \$47,000.

Back of the U.S. in the team race came the defending champion South Africans at 553. Gary Player of South Africa, the individual winner last year, wound up with a 72-hole score of 277. Third in the team race was Nationalist China at 554, followed by Australia 556, Japan 561, Canada 563 and Argentina 565.

Tied with Nicklaus for individual third at 273 was Lu Liang-huan of Nationalist China, followed by Palmer at 276, Harold Henning of South Africa at 276 and Player, Bob Charles of New Zealand and Bruce Devlin of Australia at 277.

Knudson went into the final 18-hole round with a 54-hole score of 198, four strokes better than Palmer, five over Sugimoto, and six over Nicklaus.

Both made pars on the first hole, each driving 280 yards, and hitting the green with their second shots. Sugimoto's was 29 feet from the pin and Knudson's 15 and each needed two putts.

But Nicklaus put together a final round 68, that almost overtook the Canadian, and Sugimoto, who added a 69 to previous rounds of 66, 69 and 68, tied Knudson with birdies on the 13th, 14th, 15th and 17th holes.

The sudden-death playoff on the 6,962-yard, par-72 course was played in a cold rain in semi-darkness in the presence of Prince Hitachi, who later made the awards.
