SIX HUNDRED and eighty-three bears were killed in New Brunswick in 1882—at a cost to the Treasury—for bounties—of \$2,042.

HON. MR. McLELLAN, Minister of Marine, has gone to London, to be present at the opening of the Fisheries Exhibition.

THE Bank of Montreal Directors have declared a 5 per cent dividend and put \$250,000 to rest account. The rest now amounts to \$5,750,000.

A BOX containing powder was found in the rear of the London Times office on Thursday last. A train had been late to effect an explosion at a convenient moment. One report says the fuse was burning when discovered.

A HUNDRED APPLICANTS for a DOZEN POSITIONS.—About a hundred applicants have been received from persons wishing to be employed as seasonal clerks. There are only a dozen positions to be filled.—Winnipeg Times.

SAYS the Winnipeg Times: Langdon, Shepard & Co., paid a sum of \$14,041 duty on thirteen cars of mules, which arrived here yesterday. There were two hundred and nine animals, and they were sent to the end of the track during the afternoon.

A LEGISLATIVE dead-lock is reported in the Illinois State Legislature. The Republicans have a majority of one, but he has weakened on the point of issue, and refuses to help them. The Democrats are trying to spirit him out of town and Republican watchers follow him night and day.

EVIDENTLY the position of envoy to Her Majesty the Queen of Madagascar is not a very enviable position. Some suspicion of the fidelity of the envoys now on a visit to Europe having arisen in Madagascar, the envoys are afraid to return to their native island until they have ascertained definitely how the land lies.

THE Turf, Field, and Farm, has received from Wallace Ross a ticket of agreement for a scullers race with Edward Hanlan to be rowed in best and best boats over the course at Ogdensburg, N. Y. The date is left blank. With the articles of agreement came a draft for \$500 to cover the deposit of Hanlan. The stake named is \$1,000 a side.

THE Steamer "St. Lawrence" left Summerside this morning at nine for Point duChene. She will return this evening with mails, which will arrive in this city early. The "Princess of Wales" was detained in the ice in the bay last night and did not arrive here until six o'clock this morning. She left again shortly after ten o'clock.

AN out-going tenant illustrates the absurdity of some of the covenants in leases drawn in the ancient form by advertising in an English paper for 500 rats and about ten times that number of weeds, in order to fulfil his covenant to leave the premises in precisely the same condition as that in which he found them. The rats, he adds, must be able bodied, and no cripples will be received.

Lohlein's duties, however, have long been merely nominal, and he resides for the greater part of the year at his house in Windsor Castle.

EVANGELISTIC.—Mr. Arthur Gurney of the London Evangelistic Society is expected to arrive here by the "Sarmatian" on Saturday and will address a meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Hall on Sunday evening. Mr. Gurney comes highly recommended and has for several years given himself voluntarily to Evangelistic services in the London Society.—Hx. Herald.

It is rumored in St. John that the two Gallaghers, charged with dynamite plots in England, are natives of St. John. One is supposed to have studied medicine under Dr. Earle there, and the other served his time under Mr. James Harris as a machinist. They left that city about eight years ago, but have visited several times up to three years ago.

THE total yield of gold in Nova Scotia for 1882 was 14,107 oz. 3 dwts. 20 grains, against 10,756 oz. 13 dwts. 3 grains, during the preceding year. This is the largest yield since 1871, except during 1877, when the production rose to 16,882 oz. The average run of the ore is not high, as the yield from the whole crushing of the country only equals 12 dwts. 18 grains (about \$11.55) per ton, and the average yield for the 21 years during which the mines have been worked is only 16 dwts. 2 grains, equal at \$15 per oz. to \$13.58 per ton.

JOHN BRIGHT, Nonconformist, Quaker, and Radical, attended March 28th, the marriage of his son, W. L. Bright—who is also N. Q., and R. at least as pronouncedly as his father—to a Quaker lady, and the ceremony was celebrated in an Anglican church with a liturgy, by a Broad Church canon of Westminster Abbey. None of the relatives of either bride or groom were Anglo-Irish, and there was hardly a churchman present save the distinguished par-

A writer in a late number of the Patriot signing himself Rob Roy belittles the decision given at the Head of Hillsborough Debating Club on the N. P., talks of Cromwell, axes to grind, etc. An elector, who would sell his vote for the important office of Inspector of votes, as "Rob Roy" has done, can well afford to mention "axes to grind." I am told that the Conservatives at Hillsborough are prepared to discuss the N. P., at any time, with the Grits of the same place.

The London Times' correspondent at Paris says that the agreement between Germany, Austria and Italy was reached in June last, at which time a triple note was drawn up guaranteeing the respective territories and maritime rights of three countries against aggression. The agreement is for six years.
