**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**—The Prince Edward Island branch of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada held its annual meeting yesterday in Summerside with 44 members attending. This was the first time the association has met in Summerside.

Farker Newton, Clyde River, presided at both morning and afternoon business sessions at the department of agriculture office on Water Street.

Mr. MacRae complimented breeders on their Holstein-Friesian cows and urged farmers to have one good cow instead of two poor ones. He said that "there is room on P.E.I. for all beef and dairy products that can be produced."

Deputy minister of agriculture, Stewart Wright, also spoke enthusiastically about the shows which are to be held this summer.

The plans are being prepared for the Maritime Holstein Field Day, which is being held on Saturday, June 30, on the farm of Elmer MacDonald in Hunter River.

Mr. Newson in his president's report said it was a good year with Holstein business steady, and registrations up to 1,100.

During the year they sold for the first time, cattle to Cuba, and in the last round of grading there were 286 head classifying in P.E.I. from 40 herds for 44 per cent very good, good plus or better.

Edmont Bay is receiving an increased grant from the P.E.I. government for its exhibition this year and all the other grants remained the same.

## S'side Council Is Considering Necessity Of Pigeon Control

**SUMMERSIDE**—A petition against pigeons enlivened an otherwise routine meeting of the Summerside Town Council last night and brought the council to an entirely new problem which it appears to not provide for in the town by-laws.

The pigeon problem was raised through a petition from a dozen residents of the Belmont Street area who claimed that pigeons which were sheltered and fed at a residence in this area creating a messy nuisance in the surrounding neighbourhood and urged that the pigeons should go.

While councillors who had inspected the area agreed that the problem did exist, a search of the by-laws indicated that legislation was lacking on law-breaking pigeons.

Although the town has recently appointed a dog-catcher, it was generally agreed that his duties could hardly be extended to represent the association on the Dominion executive.

Authorization was entered for police to follow up on this matter where satisfactory improvements of the properties had not been made.
