MAIL BAG FOUND.—The bag which contained the letter mailed by Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh to the Magdalen Islands last month was found in a field at Souris on Saturday. The bag had evidently been ripped open, and the contents consisted of a solitary newspaper. Mr. Tidmarsh's letter contained \$1000. The bag had evidently been placed in the field recently. KLONDIKE KING FAILS.—According to a late despatch from Victoria, B. C., the reign of Alexander McDonald as Klondike King is ended, and he has again started out as a poor miner, leaving his bride in Dawson with a horde of creditors, for whose benefit all his interests, both mining and trading, have been assigned. In his formal declaration of insolvency, filed at Dawson on July 29th, McDonald states his liabilities to be approximately six millions, while there is no way of fairly computing his assets, as his investments are of large problematical value. As they will have to be sacrificed, McDonald says there will not be enough to go around, although he believes their ultimate value will prove to be \$20,000,000 at least. McDonald's bail from Cape Breton and was one of the first, as well as one of the most fortunate, of Klondike pioneers

ELECTRIC STORM.—A severe electric storm passed over the city about one o'clock this morning. There was also a heavy fall of rain.

STOLEN.—Thieves entered the office of E. H. Norton some time after the auction on Friday evening, probably during tea hour, and by prying open the desk made off with \$26 00 in cash, nearly all of which was in silver and cents. A do/la's worth of postage stamps in the name drawer was not touched.

THE TURF.—An interesting bill of fare has been prepared for the race meeting on the North Sydney Driving Park on Labor Day. The cards include a free-for-all for a purse of \$250, a 2 30 class for \$200 and 2.45 and running races for purses of \$150 each. All classes are open to the maritime provinces, trotters only. Entries close August 26th.

HUSBAND BEATER ARRESTED.—Elizabeth Doyle, wife of Thomas Doyle, a Halifax liquor dealer, was arrested last week on a charge of assaulting her husband. She admitted that she struck him because he was continually annoying her. "She wanted to live quietly, but she could not do so with him." She was convicted and remanded for sentence. The wife gives her age as sixteen years. The husband is a large, powerful looking man of forty years.

FELL THIRTY FEET.—A man named Wesley Wheaton, of Upper Sackville, met with a very narrow escape from death last Wednesday evening. Mr. Wheaton with a span of horses attached to an engine and boiler, used in pressing hay, was crossing what is known as the Fork's bridge when the strings broke and horses and load fell about 30 feet. Mr. Wheaton fortunately was walking at the time and when the engine fell it went from him. It fell toward him he would probably have been buried beneath it and instantly killed. The engine fell on one of the horses killing it. The other horse was slightly injured. Mr. Wheaton is able to be around again. The engine and boiler weighed between three and four tons.—Post.

PROFIT SHARING.—Clayton & Sons, the Halifax clothing manufacturers and the largest employers of labor in that city, having a staff of over 400 hands, announce that in future the profits of the business when these exceed ten per cent will be divided among their employees. Interest at the rate of 7 per cent on the capital invested must first be paid. For the purpose of apportioning the profits in excess of ten per cent the employees are divided into four classes. The first class, including employees occupying the most responsible positions, will receive forty per cent, the second class thirty per cent, the third class twenty per cent, and the fourth class ten per cent. The scheme goes into effect immediately.

P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.—The annual report of the Prince Edward Island Hospital for 1898-99 has just been issued. The report shows cash subscriptions for the maintenance of the institution amounting to \$1,196 21, being \$243 18 in excess of the previous year. The church collections amounted to \$224 34, being \$84.42 short of the preceding year. The receipts from entertainments total \$86 62, and the patients fees amount to \$1290. The nurses fees received was \$132 50. There were 125 outside calls for nurses, of which 105 were accepted. The number of patients admitted during the year was 152. These, with the 11 in the Hospital at the end of the year, makes the number treated 163. The patients from the city numbered 51, from the country districts 94 and other provinces 18. The number of paying patients was 90 and non-paying 73. The medical cases numbered 64, surgical 98. There were 96 operations out of 98 surgical cases. The discharged cured numbered 122, improved 16, not treated 3, incurable 4, deaths 5. The new hospital is to be completed by Nov. 1st. The contract price for the building itself is \$12,080. The report was printed by Mr. John Coombs, and the work has been well performed.

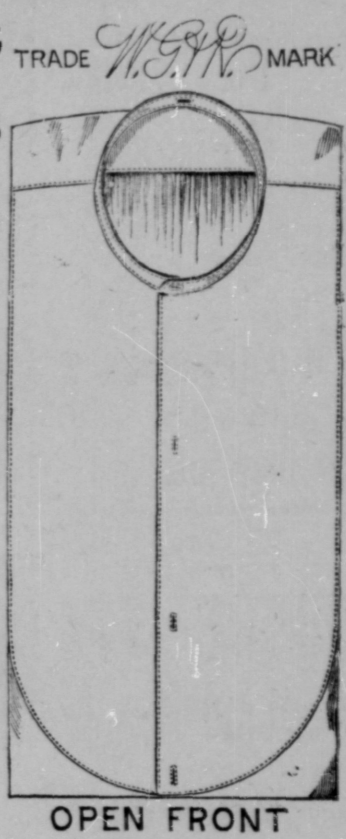

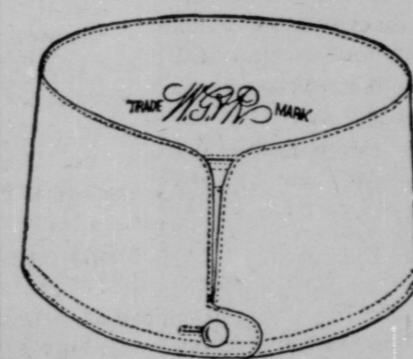
