Prince Consort Exhibition.

Great Gathering of Farmers.

Address to and Reply of Lt-Governor Macdonald.

The U. S. Consul Addresses the People.

Summerside, Oct. 1.

The Exhibition of the Agricultural and Mechanical Industries of Prince County, was opened by Lieutenant-Governor Macdonald this forenoon. An immense assembly was present. William Strong, Esq., Chairman of the Exhibition Commissioners, read the following ADDRESS:

To His Honor the Honorable ANDREW A. MACDONALD, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island. MAY I PLEASE YOUR HONOR.—The Board of Commissioners appointed for managing this Exhibition of Agriculture and Industry for Prince County desire to assure Your Honor to the satisfaction and to invite your patronage and consideration of the County's productions.

In common with all Canadians, we rejoice to know that our country has been blessed with abundant crops during the past season, and with propitious weather to harvest the same. For these inestimable favors, as well as for the substantial success that has attended the prosecution of our people in other industrial occupations, we owe, and reverently offer, our grateful acknowledgments to an all-wise and beneficent Providence.

The past year has been an eventful one in our country's history. While the unhappy circumstances which have beset the Dominion have retarded and impeded for a while the pursuit of the arts of peace, brought sorrow and mourning into many homes, yet the prompt and gallant manner in which our countrymen have suppressed and re-established our civil institutions vindicated and effective terms the heavy, endurance and patriotism of our militia force, and our ample material resources to maintain before the world the prestige and integrity of this fair Dominion.

It affords the inhabitants of Prince County, as in the case of the whole Province, much gratification to have been notified that the Colonial and Indian Exhibition to be held next year in London, offers to our artisans, farmers, manufacturers, and all those who are engaged in the production of their skill and enterprise represented on that occasion.

In continuing competition to the Colonies and Indian Dependencies, and in endorsing the great event with Her Majesty's approbation, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales having accepted the honorary presidency thereof, we cannot but feel that the Dominion of Prince Edward Island has another proof of the solicitude of the Mother Country to fittingly recognize the dignity and growing importance of her Colonies and Empire, in the group of which Canada may assuredly acknowledge no superior.

We have no doubt that this Province of the Dominion will appreciate the recognition conferred upon it in the appointment of two resident agents charged with the collection of specimens of native exhibits, and the advantages to be derived by their transmission to London, in order to compete for those distinctions and prizes to which we hope their merits may entitle them.

We are glad to see Your Honor manifest such active interest in the success of these local exhibitions, and we respectfully thank you for your present official visit to our county town.

Trusting that a display of articles within this building and upon the show grounds may meet with reasonable commendation, I have the honor, in the name of my fellow-commissioners, to request that you will be pleased to now formally open the day's proceedings.

Lieutenant Governor Macdonald replied as follows:

MR. CHAIRMAN.—Knowing that many of the leading agriculturists who farm scientifically reside in Prince County, and that at this exhibition of its agriculture and industry, I should witness the latest results of their skill, I accepted your invitation to attend the opening with great pleasure, and you have now placed me under additional obligations to you by the kindly welcome extended to me in the address of your Commissioners to whom I return my grateful acknowledgments.

Providence has, indeed, blessed us this year with one of the finest seasons ever known, even in the memory of that mysterious individual, the oldest inhabitant. Our crops have never been so excellent, but they have been saved in splendid condition, and our people are prosperous and happy. We have been freed from those pestiferous epidemics and peace and good order prevail once more throughout the Dominion. Truly, we enjoy innumerable blessings for which we should bow and reverently thank Almighty God.

I have already observed on the grounds a most creditable display of the productions and manufactures of this flourishing county, and this, together with the numbers of visitors, testifies to the Exhibition, shows that the Commissioners and officers are doing their duty, and that the people generally take an active and intelligent interest in the display.

Although there must be a certain sameness about these annual shows, they still serve many useful purposes. They are a means of increasing the rest and recreation after the labors of the harvest; it is a festival on which the merits and demerits of the various productions and exhibits are discussed. Successful competitors are eagerly questioned as to their methods of cultivation, and they are always ready to impart the desired information. Those who study carefully the annual displays find in them abundant evidence of the improvement of our stock, the better quality and increasing number of our fruits and vegetables, the expansion of our manufactures, and the increasing comfort and prosperity of our population.

I am pleased to learn that the inhabitants of Prince County have already been invited to the Colonial and Indian Exhibition, to be held in London in May next. The Colonial Empire has been invited to exhibit specimens of its productions, manufactures and resources, in that great metropolis, where they will be inspected by representatives of all nations, and viewed with interest by millions of visitors anxious to learn all that can be learned from a personal inspection of our resources, and such a splendid opportunity as this affords to bring them to the notice of the civilized world was never before so favorable. Our own Garden Province should therefore take a prominent part, and materially swell the general contribution. Our exhibits must not be limited to the mere productions of the farm, the workshop, or the mill; we must collect and forward specimens of every article, great and small, that the colony produces, the sea supplies us with, our mechanics manufacture, our artists and inventors originate, or the nimble fingers of the fair daughters of Prince Edward Island produce. We will not have to compete with the productions or manufactures of foreign countries, nor yet with those of Great Britain itself, for the Exhibition will be confined exclusively to what its name implies, and we may rest assured that the great extent and the water are exceedingly anxious to see what our resources are, for they have voluntarily contributed from their private purses £150,000 toward the guarantee fund required to be raised to erect a space in the finest portion of the Exhibition have been allotted to the Dominion of Canada for its exhibits. Every Province of the Dominion is now actively preparing for this great event, and we have here two resident gentlemen with large experience in local and Provincial Exhibitions, and despatch of our exhibits, the collection and forwarding of our exhibits, will, I feel confident, do its part to sustain the character of the contribution sent from the fair Isle of Kings.

When addressing the people of Prince Edward Island at the very excellent local exhibition held there this week, I referred also to the desirability of feeding our course, grains and roots to the stock we raise, so that, instead of exporting the raw material, we should send Beef, Pork, Mutton, Lamb and Cheese, and I pointed out the advantage such a change would be to the producer, for lessening the cost of transport and increasing the value of the article exported, he would be enabled to obtain a much larger sum from his sales, his crops would be consumed on the fertile lands, but I find that many of the course I used only say that I hope next season and London will find refrigerators capable of taking fresh meats and other articles in the hottest season, and it will then only require such attention to be of good quality to ensure

favorable prices and an unlimited demand for them.

I have now the honor, at your desire, to declare this Exhibition formally open, and I trust that the efforts of all concerned to make it the best that has yet been held in this County, may be crowned with the fullest measure of success.

Three hearty cheers were then given for Lieutenant Governor Macdonald and for the United States Consul. Mr. Keim, on coming forward, said: "As a rule, great men of the Anglo Saxon race came from the soil; but as there are plenty of great men now in the world, he would advise the young farmers of Prince County to stick to the farms as best for themselves and best for the country."

The exhibition is first class in every particular. There is a splendid display of roots, vegetables, fruit, cheese, grain, horses, cattle and sheep.

The Turco-Roumelian Troubles.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 1. The Bashi-Bazouks have ransacked and burned several villages in Roumelia.

Heavy cannonading has been heard during the last few days in the disturbed districts, and a desperate fight is believed to be in progress.

Latest investigation shows that the Turkish army is demoralized. The large sums voted for the army have been stolen by the war officials. The actual fighting strength is only half that represented by recent papers. The army is without uniforms, boots and ammunition. The cavalry have neither horses nor fodder, and there are now six thousand Turks face to face with five thousand Bulgarians and Roumelians in that now united State.

The Turkish ironclads ordered to sea cannot go for want of coal.

All appearances indicate that there will be heavy fighting between Bashi-Bazouks and Bulgarians within the next few days.

Reckless Disregard of Life and Property.

CORK, Oct. 1. Judge Ferguson, in an address at the opening of the Assizes yesterday, declared that never before in the history of Ireland had such reckless disregard of life and property been known. If immediate steps were not taken for the suppression of crime a more stringent Coercion Act than ever would be necessary to restore order.

St. John Bridge.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 1. The bridge at the Falls was formally opened yesterday. Two hundred distinguished visitors were present.

\$2,000,000 Fire.

IQUIQUE, PERU., Oct. 1. A two million dollar fire occurred here yesterday.

GRAND Colonial Exhibition in London, Eng., 1886.

FIFTY-FOUR THOUSAND FEET RESERVED FOR CANADA.

FIRST ROYAL EXHIBITION COMMISSION SINCE 1862.

THE COLONIAL AND INDIAN EXHIBITION to be held in LONDON, England, commencing MAY 1st, 1886, is intended to be on a scale of great magnitude, having for its object to mark an epoch in the relations of all the parts of the British Empire with each other.

In order to give becoming significance to the event, a Royal Commission is issued for the holding of this Exhibition for the first time since 1862; and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has been appointed President by Her Majesty.

The very large space of 54,000 square feet has been allotted to the Dominion of Canada by command of the President, His Royal Highness. This Exhibition is to be purely colonial and Indian, and no competition from the United Kingdom or from foreign nations will be permitted, the object being to exhibit to the world at large what the Colonies can do.
