## Generator Commissioned In Dual Ceremony At S'ide

A dual ceremony at the town's stator, approximately 150 persons were present for the opening and heard short talks from Mayor J.E. Morrison; Hon. George Dewar, M.D. minister of education; W. George Smith, Canadian sales manager of the Hawker Siddeley firm, engine suppliers; Deputy Mayor Ken and Hon. Hubert MacNeill, M.D. minister of health. Following the formalities the public toured the clean, up-to-date plant under the guidance of town electrical superintendent Thomas Richardson. The expansion in the town in the past three years has made the new development at the plant necessary, Mayor Morrison said, but now with such a fine unit (the generator has the capacity of 2,500 kilowatts and puts out 4,100 volts) there is little need of electrical utility expansion at this time.
