

Banks Claims Attempts To Abolish Union Violence

By ALEXANDER FARRELL, MONTREAL (CP)—H. G. Banks, deposed president of the Seafarers' International Union of Canada (IUC), said here he has been trying to cut out union violence in the 15 years he has been in Canada.

Testifying in his own defence at his trial for conspiring to injure an official of another union, Banks said "one of my big jobs here has been to prevent violence down, not to cause it."

Under cross-examination by Crown Prosecutor Jean Martineau, he said he does not believe in violence and for that reason has always "told the boys to keep their hands in their pockets." He said he has never ordered any of his men to heat up anybody.

Charged with conspiracy to wound, maim or disgrace Capt. Henry Francis Walsh, a former organizer for the Canadian Merchant Service Guild (CSC), Banks spent four hours on the witness stand—two hours under direct examination by defence counsel, two hours under cross-examination by the Crown.

The Crown is expected to continue its cross-examination today.

PERJURY CHARGED

Banks said three Crown witnesses have perjured themselves at the trial: Michael Sheehan and Joseph Wood, both former IUC members, and Richard Greaves, a former official of the National Association of Marine Engineers (N.A.M.E.).

"It's part of a deliberate plot having to do with the IUC and the waterfront," he said.

Banks said he had no difficulties in the summer of 1957 with the Canadian Merchant Service Guild or with Walsh, who was beaten up in a hotel parking lot in Owen Sound, Ont., Aug. 16, 1957.

"Were you not fighting over the same men?" asked Mr. Martineau.

"Not in 1957," Banks replied.

"You pretend today that there was no conflict at that time between your two unions?"

"I certainly do."

CONFLICT DEVELOPED

Banks said no conflict developed between the two unions until "much later," and that was caused by a vote won by the Merchant Service Guild.

He said he heard a rumour late in 1957 Walsh had been beaten up. Some union member had told him that he did not remember which one.

In reply to Mr. Martineau, he said he had no reason to investigate the rumour.

"But a lot of your men were out there at different parts," the prosecutor said. "Don't you think it was your duty to investigate?"

"If any of our men had been involved, I would have heard about it," Banks said. "We had no men in Owen Sound. I could not go down every rumour."

Banks denied testimony that Greaves had called Jack Palmer, Edson Richardson and Paul Garab into his office at IUC headquarters in Montreal and ordered them to beat up Walsh.

Financing Of Cyprus Force Will Be Continued By Gov't

By DAVE McINTOSH, OTTAWA (CP)—The government has decided to continue to finance the 1,750-man Canadian contingent in Cyprus until the first three-month period for the United Nations force there expires June 27, informed sources said here.

However, the government has not ruled out its avowed aim that the UN force in Cyprus must be the collective financial responsibility of all UN members.

At the next meeting of the UN General Assembly it will press for retroactive contributions by the UN membership to the force.

This meeting is unlikely to take place until after the United States presidential election in November because many UN members, including Canada, don't want to deal with the issue of Communist Chinese membership before then.

This means barring an unforeseen quick settlement of the Cyprus problem that Canada will have paid some \$2,000,000 to help its contingent in Cyprus before the UN General Assembly deals with the matter of the force's financing.

PAY DOWN COSTS

The UN force in Cyprus was established because the countries contributing personnel

Canada, Britain, Sweden, Finland and Ireland, agreed to pay the costs of their own contingents for the first three months.

Nobody here expects the force to be able to leave Cyprus by June 27, and plans already have been made by Canada, at least, to continue its operations. It hasn't yet been decided whether Canadian troops in Cyprus will be relieved after six months, as in the Congo, or after a year, as in Egypt.

Canada has already begun to withdraw troops from the UN force in Congo which is scheduled to wind up its operations June 30 after four years.

Meanwhile, because of the Canadian involvement in Cyprus, it has been decided that Canada will take on credit for production of F-104 low-level jet bombers for Greece and Turkey—these 120 planes were assembled at Canadian facilities, Montreal, for the Canadian and United States, mutual aid program for NATO allies in Europe. The U.S. put up \$150,000,000 and Canada \$30,000,000.

Canada now will withdraw discreetly from any mention in the program because its NATO partners, Greece and Turkey, are at odds over the Cyprus situation.

Newspaper Ads Are Rated Twice As Effective As Tv

Newspaper advertising is twice as effective as TV advertising among 1,000 persons interviewed in Charlotte, North Carolina, by the Myers Park High School distributive education class.

For a class project, students conducted a door-to-door survey to determine the effectiveness of all advertising. The survey was sponsored by the Sales and Marketing Executives International in co-operation with the Distributive Education Clubs of America, reports Editor and Publisher.

Of the women interviewed, 83 per cent said they consult newspaper ads before shopping. Only 41 per cent said they consult television advertising and 35 per cent said they consult radio advertising. Some 63 percent of the women said they would prefer more advertising in their newspaper, and 56 percent noted they would prefer their ads in color. The survey indicates 89 per cent said they clipped ads from the newspaper and saved them or took them on shopping trips.

The survey revealed, 66 per cent of the women had ordered merchandise by phone or mail because they had seen a newspaper ad for the product. TV had caused 31 per cent to do this and radio had stimulated only 31 per cent to do so. Eighty-five per cent said they favored newspapers with advertising, however, 64 per cent favored TV without advertising. Sixty per cent would prefer no ads on radio.

Slightly more than half questioned said stores that advertised trading stamps do not attract their patronage.

Other findings: 74 per cent of the women said advertising makes shopping easier, 72 per cent said it saves time, 64 per cent said it saves money and 53 per cent said it contributes to their education.

One Province Is Interesting

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland says a proposal that the four Atlantic provinces form one province of Canada is "interesting."

Mr. Smallwood was commenting on a suggestion by Premier Bennett of British Columbia who proposed last week that Atlantic provinces should form one province and the three Prairie provinces form another five-province nation.

Mr. Smallwood said it is an "interesting suggestion—interesting enough to make it worth looking at." He had no further comment.
