The wharf at Tignish Run needs ballasting and refitting to ensure it against destruction in the next storm. The Government has been too careless about it.

The names of R. Sloggett, Mrs. John Quirk, Miss Quirk, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Robinson appear in the list of the Nova Scotian's passengers from Halifax to Great Britain.

Mr. H. C. VINNICOMBE'S pleasure boat Maud, while sailing in the harbor last evening, ran foul of Peake's No. 3 Wharf, carrying away her jib-boom, bow-sprit, and jib-boom topsail halyards. The hull was also very much damaged.

The microphone is to be employed by the Research Committee of the National Association of Spiritualists, whose inquiries have already exploded several of the more or less well laid schemes of pretenders to "mediumship."

We deeply regret to hear that James McLaughlin, Esq., of Souris, has lost two daughters by diphtheria. One of them, aged 15 years and six months died on Sunday, and the next day the other, who is thirteen years old, fell a victim to the disease.—Patriot.

DISCOVERY OF A COMET.—Prof. Lewis Swift, of Rochester, N. Y., has discovered a comet in the constellation of Hercules. It is in the right ascension about 17 h. 40 m., declination north 18 deg. It is large but faint, and moving very slowly to the southwest.

The total eclipse of the sun on the 29th inst., visible over a great portion of North America, will be an event of great scientific interest. Preparations on an extended scale have already been made for its observation in the United States, and Congress has devoted the sum of \$8,000 to the purpose.

THE HAVERLY JUBILEE SINGERS will appear in the Market Hall on Friday and Saturday evenings next. This troupe has been travelling for some time through the Provinces and have met with great success at mostly all their appearances. We hope they will meet with the same success in this city.

The Bishop of Manchester, speaking on the Lancashire strike and lock-out, remarked that the land could never be again prosperous unless English people became more sober and industrious. Drunkenness seemed to be creeping everywhere, like leprosy.

The Telegraph says that Hon. E. B. Chandler is to be Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick. Mr. Chandler now holds a seat in the Legislative Council. The St. John Globe reports that, although 78 years of age, he is a man of wonderful activity for his years, and of great ability. He has been in public life for a long time; and his elevation to the position of Governor of his native Province would be the fitting close of an eminent public career.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, Michael Purcell appeared on complaint of his father—James Purcell—for assault. He was convicted on a charge of vagrancy for one month with hard labor, and at the end of that time to find two sureties to keep the peace towards his father for three months; John Treanor, drunk and disorderly, was fined \$3 and costs or 14 days, and two find two sureties to keep the peace, under penalty of six months' imprisonment; L. White, drunk and disorderly, was fined \$2 and costs, or 8 days.

PRESENTATION TO MR. BRYAN O'LYNN.—Last night Mr. Bryan O'Lyinn, of the Irish minstrels, who recently appeared in this city under the management of Mr. Healy, was made the recipient of a blackthorn cane. On the head is a silver plate with "Erin Go Bragh" engraved on it, and a short distance below this another plate on which is inscribed the following:—"Presented to Bryan O'Lyinn of the Irish minstrels." A deep silver ferule bears the following names of the donors:—Prof. Harry Armstrong, John F. Lanley, Eugene Cole and Charlie Liley." The company has now disbanded and leave for New York by steamer this morning. The band, which remains here, will play Mr. O'Lyinn and company off to-day.—St. John Tel. of 10th.

THE SUPREME COURT.—The ejectment suit of Charles E. McKinnon vs. Hector McKinnon was finished this morning. The jury, after an absence of fifteen minutes, having returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for all the land claimed; E. J. Hodgson and Neil McLeod for plaintiff; Peters and Palmer for defendant. By far the most interesting trial that has engaged the attention of the Court for some years, was called on this morning. It is that of Miss Annie Mathewson, of Rose Valley, against W. McKinlay. The action is brought to recover damages for blighted love and affection. She alleges that being of a loving nature, she promised her hand and heart to the defendant; and that he, after holding them for over six years, threw her overboard, and took to himself a wife in the person of another young girl from the "Classic Vales" of Strathclyde. The Court Room is crowded with young men who appear to be anxious to acquire light on this subject. The engagement having been made in Gaelic, the witnesses are, for the most part, examined in that language. Mr. John McKinnon, the Crier, being the interpreter. Mr. Davies and Mr. Sutherland appear for the plaintiff, and Mr. Charles Palmer and H. James Palmer, are the defendant. The case will be concluded to-morrow.

THE CONGRESS.

Reading the Treaty of Peace.

BEACONSFIELD UNWELL!

THE DEATH SENTENCE PASSED UPON NOBELING.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

BERLIN, July 10.

The Congress sat four hours to-day. It ratified the committee's arrangements in regard to Batoum, and disposed of several questions of detail. The material portion of the work of Congress being herewith concluded, the reading of the Treaty of Peace was read, and the greater portion of it was read and agreed to. The Anglo-Turkish convention was not mentioned. Lord Beaconsfield was absent, suffering from a sore throat.

BERLIN, July 10.

Nobeling was arraigned to-day on the charge of attempting the life of the Emperor, and pleaded not guilty, maintaining that he only attempted to commit suicide. The city witnesses testified, however, that he aimed at the Emperor. He was sentenced to death.

EXCITEMENT IN MONTREAL.

MASSING THE MILITIA.

THE MAYOR PROTESTS

Special despatch to Examiner:

MONTREAL, July 10.

Battery A, from Kingston, arrived to-night and has taken up its quarters under canvas. Battery B left Quebec this afternoon and will be here in the morning. The regiments from the eastern townships will be here to-morrow evening.

The Mayor has issued a proclamation, to appear in the morning, protesting against bringing a large body of military from outside, at great expense to the city, and advising all peaceable people to stay at home on the 12th, and not interfere with the procession.

Irish Catholic societies have obtained legal advice from four of the most eminent lawyers here which declares the Orange body illegal and that it is the duty of the magistrates to prohibit their display.

This has been presented by a deputation to the Mayor to-night, and he has reserved his ultimatum until to-morrow. Sir Selby Smith is here, and will be in command of the troops. The excitement is intense.

Telegraphic News.

OTTAWA, July 9.

A special sitting of the Supreme Court, for the delivery of judgments, will be held on the 30th of October, not the 13th, as reported.

Telegraph communication between Winnipeg and Thunder Bay is expected to be completed within six weeks.

Counterfeit ten cent pieces are plentiful. A Victoria British Columbia despatch says evidence before the Royal Commission disclosed an astounding state of corruption at Kootenay. Votes were bought openly at the polls; American citizens passed into Kootenay, took some sort of oath before the magistrate, and controlled the election. Kootenay is situated on the southern boundary line, and has forty-five registered voters who return two members, one twelfth of the whole representation in the Local Parliament.

MONTREAL, July 9.

A Quebec despatch says that the bush fires continue to spread. The smoke was so dense in the St. Lawrence that steamers due at six yesterday morning only arrived at eight at night. A fire raging back of the Three Rivers in a swamp has already destroyed a large portion of the branch shore road many miles long, only lately constructed and not yet changed over to the Government by the contractors. The River Noir bridge had a narrow escape, the floor timbers being scorched. All houses in the vicinity and 3000 cords of wood were destroyed. The employees of the line were compelled to construct a raft and launch out on Lake Tortue to save their lives, being then almost scorched to death.

FREDERICTON, July 9.

During a violent storm of wind and rain this afternoon, a small building near Stewart's mill was blown down, and a young lad named Wilkes, aged 9 years, while endeavoring to escape from the wreck, was struck by a flying board and killed. The storm lasted about half an hour. It was a splendid rain storm, doing a world of good and cooling the atmosphere. The thermometer had reached 98°.

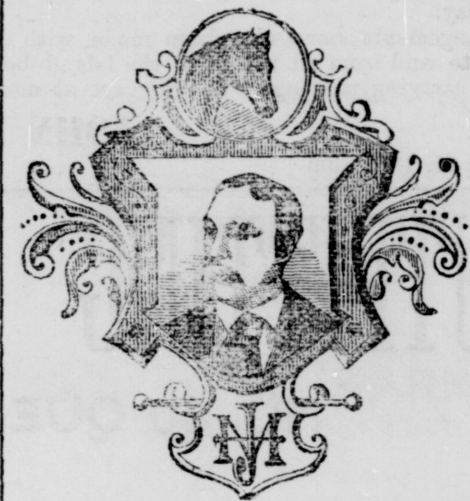
