Wm. Cunard, of Halifax, has contributed \$500 to the building fund of the Home for the Aged in that city.

A TRADER stopping in a hotel in Montreal lost a purse containing \$3,000, but the chambermaid found and returned it.

It is reported that the Halifax Free Library is likely to prove failures, the wealthy citizens of that city declining to contribute to its support.

The steamer Worcester, Capt. G. D. Allan, arrived from Boston this morning with freight, and Miss Jean Newbery, Mr. A. M. Dexter and Mr. Frank Conrad as passengers.

The steamer Princess of Wales left for Pictou this morning. She encountered heavy weather and may not return to-night. The steamer St. Lawrence left Summerville this morning but returned at 2 o'clock.

An inquest was held on the body of Thomas B. Hannah, the young man killed while playing football in St. John, on Sunday, and the jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

The yachts Claribel and Sunbeam lying between Pownal wharf and Connolly's wharf, were carried by the storm into the breakwater below the residence of Benjamin Devis, Esq. They received slight injuries.

A CAPE BRETONER who recently eloped with the daughter of a neighboring farmer, says the North Sydney Herald, was, a few hours after the marriage, "intervened by the father of the bride and is now an invalid."

The Presidential Election.

No Comprehensive Returns.

BOSTON, Nov. 4. The election throughout the country passed off much more quietly than was anticipated. In Cincinnati there were two or three fatal encounters. A general rainstorm has prevailed during the evening, which has impaired the telegraphic service to such an extent as to prevent anything like comprehensive returns of the result.

Such returns as have been received, however, give the following indications:—Cleveland carried New Jersey and Connecticut by small majorities; Illinois is doubtful; Ohio is strongly for Blaine; that the Republicans may break the "solid South" by carrying Virginia and West Virginia; New York gives a result largely favorable to Cleveland.

It is supposed the Republicans may be defeated in Indiana, and generally thought from present information that Cleveland is returned.

LATEST.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5. Reports very contradictory, and results uncertain. Blaine carries New England, except Connecticut; also Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota and Kansas. Cleveland carried the solid South, except Virginia and West Virginia (which are doubtful). New Jersey and Connecticut. The following are claimed by both parties:—New York, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, Virginia, West Virginia, California and Oregon. New York State is close—supposed will not be five thousand either way.

Democrats seem most hopeful, but, until fuller returns are received, it is impossible to more than guess who is elected. In several states majorities will be very small.

Gordon's Plucky Reply, "Will Hold Khartoum for Twelve Years."

LONDON, Nov. 4. Gen. Wolseley telegraphs from Dongola that Col. Kitchener telegraphs that the Arabs from the south report all quiet. One of our messengers, who was sent to Khartoum some days ago, reached that place and was received by Gen. Gordon with a parade of his troops. The Mahdi had advanced opposite Khartoum and asked Gen. Gordon to surrender. Gordon replied that he would hold Khartoum against him for twelve years.

Gen. O'Neil, the Fenian raider, has died in Texas.

The agitation among the Skye officers is increasing.

A precedence motion for the Franchise Bill has been passed.

A general movement up the Nile will commence next week.

A man has been given twelve lashes in Winnipeg, for breaking gaol.

There is an agitation for the abolition of grocers' licenses in Hamilton.

A thousand Chinamen sailed from San Francisco for home on the 30th ult.

Brignoli, the celebrated tenor, died at New York, of internal hemorrhage.

It is said that Britain is preparing to annex the whole coast of the Red Sea to Egypt.

Christine Leslie, the baby farmer, has been acquitted of the charge of manslaughter.

The result of the election for members of the second chamber in Holland shows a Liberal gain.

It is an unmarried lady of Boston who proposes that single ladies hereafter be called "bachelettes."

Hamilton boys, emulating the cowboys of the Wild West, have lassoed a man, who has died from his injuries.

The New York Annual State Convention report shows that 3,000 converts had been baptised during the year.

It has been held in the Quebec Court of Review that an unpaid vendor has a right to seize goods wherever found.

The Parnellites voted with the Conservatives in a division on Lord Churchill's motion censuring Mr. Chamberlain.

The Hon. G. W. Ross expresses the school book policy of the Ontario Government as being the one best book system.

Mr. Stephenson, Superintendent of the Grand Trunk Railway, believes the men will cheerfully grant the extension of the reduction in their pay.

Mr. L. A. Senegal has been fined \$800 for illegal practices at Vercheres election. Hastings temperance people have decided to submit the Scott Act to the electors.

The skeletons of 80,000 buffaloes have been shipped from Dakota this year, to be ground into fertilizers for the older fields. The bones are worth 32s. per ton at the shipping station.

The small daughter of W. K. Vanderbilt is said to have asked her mother at the end of the first week in the new house, referring to the Gothic dining-room, "Have we always got to eat in the church?"

M. Dubois, of Paris, finds that chloroform acts with extraordinary rapidity on criminals after the introduction of alcohol into the system, and terminates death with startling abruptness. This discovery may form a cue to the fatality of chloroform in some cases.

Max O'Rell understands that in England kissing is confined to the mouth, but he laments that he has had no opportunities for personal observation on this interesting question, for "those confounded islanders always took care to wait until I was gone before they indulged in these delightful proofs of intimacy."

There are more than 100,000 women and girls who make a living on the streets of Paris as licensed vendors. Thirty-five thousand of them are under eighteen, 17,000 under fifteen, and 5,000 of them are little girls under thirteen years of age. They are allowed to grow up as pagans, with no religious or moral instruction.

It is proposed in Italy to throw a bridge over the Straits of Messina that separates Sicily from Italy. Between Cape del Pezzo and Garziri, where the channel is two and a half miles in width, and the depth of water 361 feet, is the place selected. Two great piers will support a viaduct of steel raised to a height of 328 feet above the water.

The Montreal Journal of Commerce says that Canadian cheese and cattle shipments, during the season of open navigation, have footed up about \$11,000,000, of which cheese furnished six and cattle five millions. As compared with the corresponding period of 1879 shipments of cheese have increased 100 per cent., and of cattle about 70 per cent.

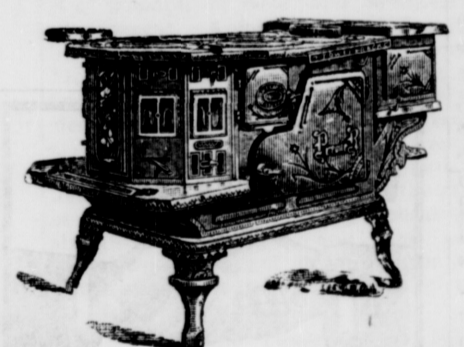
