Program Is Paying Off
REGINA (CP)—Five years ago F. G. Bard, director of the Saskatchewan Museum of Natural History, began a program of conserving and breeding Canada geese here and it is paying off. In an effort to induce the birds back to their once native nesting grounds in southern Saskatchewan, Mr. Bard undertook the breeding of Canada geese at the Wascana Creek bird sanctuary in Regina. He began with a pair of birds. Today the sanctuary's Canada goose population totals 100.
"Wild geese stopped nesting in southern Saskatchewan years ago," Mr. Bard said. "This program is the first step in an effort to bring them back."
"It takes several years of careful stocking to get birds used to a nesting place but there are signs that the geese are beginning to return."
Since the conservation program was started the geese have been coddled and fed, ringed, traced and studied. Grain companies, bakeries and the light and power department have provided bread crusts and wheat, and regulated the cooling water from the power plant so that it will be neither too cold nor too warm.
TENDED WITH CARE
The eggs are so precious that this spring they were given to domestic hens to incubate, so that the geese would lay more.

Flu Continues To Hit Schools In Three Provinces

Influenza continued to hit students and teachers in Ontario, Manitoba and Quebec Tuesday, forcing a number of schools to extend the Thanksgiving weekend.
Sault Ste. Marie, one of the hardest hit communities in Canada, reported the closing of 11 more schools in the area, bringing the total to 15. All three of the city's secondary schools and one public school were closed. Hospital visiting is also prohibited.
In Windsor a decision was to be made Tuesday on whether to close schools for two days in addition to the four-day Thanksgiving holiday.
CASES CONFIRMED
In Halifax Health Minister Donahoe confirmed Tuesday that Asian influenza has appeared in Nova Scotia. He said two cases have been diagnosed positively. They were found among 20 passengers held in quarantine hospital here after arriving on the Italian Vulcania from the Mediterranean Sept. 10.
Mr. Donahoe said the public health laboratory here isolated Asian influenza virus from throat washings of two patients. The findings were confirmed by the federal hygiene laboratory at Ottawa.
He said, "Asian type 'flu is a comparatively mild disease, differing little from the usual outbreaks which we have had the last few years."
"Shipments of vaccine are arriving in the province but to date only in sufficient quantities for essential personnel. Many of our hospitals have already obtained sufficient for their requirements."
A health department spokesman said last week that shipments of the vaccine to this province are far behind schedule because of technical difficulties at the Connaught Laboratories in Toronto.
Most of the vaccine received so far has been bought from United States commercial sources.
TORONTO SCHOOLS CLOSED
Suburban Mimico High School joined several others in the Toronto area which have been closed due to flu. Night school classes also were suspended.
In Quebec, illness among the religious teaching staff forced St. Joseph de St. Vallier boarding school to close until next Monday. The Quebec seminary closed two days ago for 10 days.
Shawinigan Falls closed some of its schools. At nearby La Tuque seven schools were closed Monday until Oct. 15. At Grand'Mere, the high school was closed and school officials are considering closing the others.
In Winnipeg, Dr. R. M. Creighton, director of preventive medical services, said there is no epidemic in Manitoba. He said there are 1,745 influenza cases in the province, including eight proven cases of Asian flu. Flm Flon had 800 of the influenza cases and there were 200 each at Lynn Lake and Sheridan — all in northern Manitoba.
A shipment of vaccine has arrived in Winnipeg and is to be used to protect staffs at the Winnipeg General Hospital. Dr. Creighton said fewer than 500 doses were in the shipment.

Seeks To Build Sound Economy

BAHREIN (Reuters) — Bahrain, island sheikdom in the Persian Gulf, is seeking to build up a sound alternative economy in preparation for the expected day, about 25 years hence, when the island's oil wells will have been pumped dry.
This year marks the 25th anniversary of the discovery of oil here.
By 1930, Bahrain had been hit both by the world depression and the effects on its ancient pearl industry of Japan's increasing cultured pearl production.
BUBBLING RICHES
Then, almost unexpectedly after seven years of intermittent searching, oil bubbled to the sandy surface of this barren island on June 1, 1932. Since then, directly or indirectly, oil has touched the lives of each of the 120,000 Bahrainis on the island.
The Bahrain Petroleum Company (Bapco), an American-owned company registered in Canada, has become tightly interlocked in the island's daily life.
In addition to the wells, which produce about 30,000 barrels a day, the company has built one of the biggest refineries in the Middle East, which is fed by a double pipeline from Saudi Arabia and produces about 210,000 barrels a day.
It provides work for 5,850 Bahrainis and paid a total of nearly \$11,000,000 in royalties to the Bahrain government last year.
BIGGER SHARES
Over the years, new agreements have given the Bahrain government larger and larger shares in the company's profits until today it is on the 50-50 basis.
Reference to the island to "the government" is generally taken to mean the 62-year-old ruler, Sheikh Sulman Bin Hamad al Khalifa. He has absolute authority, but is generally recognized as a benevolent autocrat who acts on the advice of the expert heads of the various government departments.
When oil first was discovered in Bahrain, the sheikh was persuaded by his British adviser, Sir Charles Belgrave, to accept what was, at that time, a revolutionary proposal.
He agreed to share the oil royalties. One-third would go into the privy purse, one-third into capital projects for the community and one-third would be invested against the day when finally the oil would run out.
"The object of the government is not to waste this oil money," the ruler's 48-year-old director of finance, Sayed Mahmud Alawi, explained. "This is not a perma-

Recovering From Stabbing By Negroes

CAMDEN, N. J., — (AP) — A 15-year-old schoolboy, who told police he was stabbed and slashed by a group of Negro youths, was reported in satisfactory condition in hospital Wednesday.
Michael Pittilli said he was watching a high school football game Tuesday when he noticed a white boy being abused by about a half-dozen Negro youths. He said he suffered the knife wounds in a brief encounter with the group after going to the assistance of the unidentified youth.
Police officials in Camden, and across the Delaware River in Philadelphia, have ordered stricter enforcement of a 10 p.m. curfew law for youngsters following recent indication of racial unrest among teen-agers in the area. Three incidents of stabbings and street fights in the vicinity of several high schools have been reported.

Hunt On For Kidnap-Slayer

ROSWELL, N. M. (AP)—Police today combed deep into Mexico for the kidnap-slayer of a five-year-old girl, whose unclad body was found Monday night in a dump eight miles east of here.
Little Sandra Jo Oucero apparently died from a single stab wound in the heart. The weapon, a screwdriver, lay nearby.
Police Chief Tommy Thompson and Sheriff J. C. Jones said they will file murder charges today against Joe Franco, 24, a farm worker.
Franco, a friend of the family, has already been charged with kidnapping the child from her home early Sunday. The FBI issued a fugitive warrant for Franco.
A post-mortem was ordered on the child's body to determine exact cause of death and whether she had been sexually assaulted. Officers said it appeared to be a sex crime.

Jury Recommends Lights On Tractors Law Be Enforced

An inquest into the death of Harry Quigley of Mount Tryon, who died on September 26th from injuries in a car-tractor collision, was convened by Coroner Dr. W.E. Callahan in Summerside last evening.
The jury, after evidence of six witnesses, returned the following verdict:
"That Harry Quigley came to his death due to a brain injury received as a result of a collision between a tractor driven by one, Reginald Noonan, and a tractor driven by the deceased, on September 26, 1957, in the vicinity of Tryon in Prince County. We the jury, strongly recommend that the traffic laws pertaining to the proper lights that a tractor should carry when travelling on highways be published and rigidly enforced."
