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Maritime Council Of Catholic Nurses

The annual two-day convention of the Maritime Council of Catholic Nurses was held last week at Antigonish with representatives of the following eight guilds, St. Elizabeth's, Halifax; St. Veronica's, Charlottetown; St. Hildegard's, Sydney; St. Jude's, North Sydney; St. Eugene's, Glace Bay; Jeanne Marie, Campbellton, N.B.; St. Mary's, Inverness; St. Martha's, Antigonish. As a preliminary, an executive meeting was held at St. Martha's Hospital. The general convention was opened by Holy Mass, followed by a communion breakfast in the nurses' dining room. Celebrant was the Rev. J. Mills, Maritime chaplain of the M.C.C.N. Rev. A. J. MacAdam spoke on "Advancing the Aims of the Council." The general sessions, held at Mount St. Bernard College, opened with prayer by Rev. Alex MacLellan, C.S.S.R., Charlottetown. Greetings were extended by Mayor C. R. Mills and Mrs. Malcolm Fraser, president of the St. Martha's Guild. Presiding was Mrs. J. J. Callahan, vice-president of the M.C.C.N., who read a message from the president, Miss Lillian Grady, unavoidably absent. At the business meeting, the resolutions committee was appointed as follows: Mrs. Sidney Curry, Sydney; Mrs. L. J. O'Leary, Halifax; Mrs. Leo MacIntyre, Glace Bay; Mrs. Malcolm Fraser, Antigonish. The secretary-treasurers' report was read by Mrs. Alex MacDonald, Halifax. There was considerable discussion on the question of unity of the M.C.C.N. and the National Association of Catholic Nurses. Addressing the convention, Most Rev. J. R. MacDonald, Bishop of Antigonish, gave some concrete thoughts on the promotion on the welfare of the association. He stressed the point that the Christian attitude should be more apparent in modern nursing. A tour of St. F. X. University and St. Martha's Hospital followed.
