NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Montreal Gazette: Mr. Geoffroy, M. P., announced last night that he would vote against the Remedial Bill because it did not do enough for the Manitoba Catholics. Mr. Clarke Wallace is to vote against it because it does too much for the same Catholics.

—Whether its letter to pass the Remedial Bill now—after six years of delay—than to appoint a commission costing many thousands of dollars to inquire into a state of facts that has already been judicially investigated and decided upon—that is the question raised by the Leader of the Opposition. The Opposition has two objects in view, (1) to gain time, (2) to humbug the people by calling attention away from the law and appealing to their prejudices.

—Our greatly esteemed contemporary has not yet explained why it left out the important words when quoting the Interpretation Act. Nor has it responded to our request to publish the petition to the Governor-General-in-Council upon which is based the appeal which the Lords of the Privy Council declare to be "well founded."

—St. John Sun: So strong a Protestant journal as the Montreal Witness, which is opposed to remedial legislation for Manitoba, objects to the Crawford resolution which is before the Ontario legislature, because the resolution condemns the general principle of interference by Ottawa. The Witness does not want intervention in Manitoba, but it protests against the adoption of the non-intervention principle because it believes that intervention may yet be required for the protection of Quebec Protestants.

—The Ottawa correspondent of the Lindsay Warbler writes thus in his paper: "The life of a member of Parliament is a peculiar one. This week alone forty letters have been received by the writer, referring to the Remedial Bill. Nineteen of them recommend the member from North Victoria to vote for the bill right through, and, as one writes, 'toomply with you, as an Orangeman by doing justice.' The rest are chiefly against the bill; but some conclude by saying, 'You should do what you think best for the country while others say, 'Stick to the old party that has made Canada.' Of the nineteen ordering the member to support the bill, all are Protestants, and eleven are Orangemen, and one is a True Blue; while those advising opposition to the bill, strange to say, two are Roman Catholics. The member who pleases everyone on that bill will be a perfect marvel."
