I can read her letter I felt both sympathy and relief; shock because her letter might have been written by me and relief to know that I feel not the only person (as I had assumed) who ever suffered this particular reversal of fortune.

I feel deeply the need to talk to someone about my nostalgia, and the conscious mind, which doesn't want to come to grips with the mutiny, so to speak, in the hold of the ship.

My advice is the same as your own good sense suggests—namely, that you consult a psychiatrist or other comparable therapist so as to bring your tangled emotions into the light and into line with the real realities of your state of life. Then you will be able to find the proper place and perspective in your scheme of things.—M.H.

In all probability you are experiencing a mild depression and your compulsive encroachment in memories of the short-lived romance of the few years is a random escapade to present distress.

In short, you are taking a symptom to be the problem. I think of mild emotional depression, of longer or shorter duration, is almost as prevalent as the common cold in the human scene. And one of the familiar aspects of this vague psychological ailment is a brooding, regretful, hypochondriacal preoccupation with past personal history, a morbid feeling that one's great days are over, that one somehow missed the boat to happiness by making a supposedly wrong choice (or a series of blunders) somewhere back along the road, none of which can be rectified now.

Another routine symptom of mild depression is the tendency to draw away, involuntarily, from normally busy social interchange as, for example, a candid interview with a medical specialist or professional counselor whose help you may want or need.

To answer your question, I doubt that a good psychiatrist would accept a patient who would disclose his real name, unless the specialist foresaw from normally busy social interviews would help the patient to drop the mask and begin to integrate his forces so as to become a self-accepting, self-respecting personality.
