2. A much greater number say, with or without mental reservations, that they will follow Rhee to the Yalu or death.

Compromise Offer

"And whereas the Catholic position has been stated to be a desire to continue in operation the system now in effect in this City coupled with a compromise offer to erect a building to be rented by the School Board in the event that their request for the building of the school should not be acceptable to the School Board."
