REPORTED DEATH OF GEN. JOUBERT

Relieving Force Has Gone to Ladysmith

General Buller Will Pursue His Original Plan of Campaign. Lord Methuen and Staff Have Gone to the Front.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Nov. 16.—A despatch to the Mail from Durban, dated Nov. 11, says that Lord Methuen and his staff took the train going north in the direction of Ladysmith tonight. The London newspapers are again without news from South Africa, except the announcement of the arrival of transports at Cape Town.

Eighteen thousand troops have landed at the Cape since November 4. General Buller says that the standard is not at Cape Town but in the country to the north. He has completed plans for the relief of Ladysmith; and additional troops which are now arriving will be utilized according to the plan of campaign prepared before the General left England.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The London News Cairo despatch says that spies confirm the report that the Khalifa is advancing on Omdurman. Several British officers and a detachment of Seaforth Highlanders are going to Khartoum.

ROME, Nov. 16.—An official note issued by the Papal authorities repudiates the pro-Boer opinions recently expressed by the Observatore Romano. The note declares emphatically that the Vatican does not favor the Transvaal during the present struggle.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—George Wyndham, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for War, addressing his constituents at Dover, said that next to the affection which the colonies held for the Mother Country he would place the friendship of the United States of America.

This friendship between the American Republic and the British Empire, declared the speaker, is one of the most romantic and may become one of the most momentous and far reaching episodes of modern history. It does not, however, imply hostility to any other great power.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—A despatch from Pietermaritzburg says it is rumoured that General Joubert, the commander of the Boer forces that surrounded Ladysmith has been killed in action.

The Times, of Natal, publishes a telegram from Lorenzo Marquez saying that General Joubert was killed in the action fought at Ladysmith on the ninth of November.

THE LOBSTER SEASON.

New Regulations Compiled by the Minister of Marine.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Nov. 16.—The regulations to govern the lobster fisheries for the season of 1900 have been drawn up by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, based upon the recommendations of the lobster commission of last year.

The close season along the Bay of Fundy Coast and the adjacent Island from the main boundary along New Brunswick, around Cape Sable and as far as Halifax, is from May 1st to December 14th, inclusive.

The close season along the Nova Scotia coast from Halifax to Red Point between Martin Point and Michaud Point, Cape Breton, and including Chedabucto and St. Peter's Bay and adjacent Islands, and the Gut of Canso as far as Line, and from Flat Point to Inverness, Connolly Light house opposite, is from July 1st to March 31st following, inclusive.

Along the Cape Breton coast from Red Point to Cape North and around to Cape St. Lawrence also along the coast and waters of the Magdalen Islands including the Bird Rocks and Byron Island and along the south shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence from Bay Blanc Salmon westward to head tide, the close season is from August 1st to April 30th, inclusive.

The close season along the Northumberland Straits is not yet absolutely fixed. In all other parts the close season is from July 11th to April 19th, inclusive. Along the Northumberland Straits from a line drawn from Black Fish River, N. B. to West Point, P. E. I., and a line from Indian Point near Cape Tormentine to a point in P. E. Island not yet absolutely fixed, the size limit is seven inches.

Along the Bay of Fundy coast and around Nova Scotia as far as Halifax the limit is nine inches.

A Sharp Engagement.

MANILA, Nov. 15.—The thirty-third infantry, in one of the sharpest two hours' engagements of the war with an equal force of insurgents, five miles from San Fabian, Saturday, lost one officer and six men killed and had one officer and twelve men wounded. The Americans captured twenty-nine Filipinos and a hundred rifles and found 81 insurgents dead lying in the trenches and rice fields. Many more Filipinos doubtless were killed or wounded.

Sineews of War.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Tenders for £3,000,000 in treasury bills, the first instalment of the war fund, were opened yesterday. The total of the applications amounted to £10,721,000. The issue was allotted as follows: £2,000,000 at six months and £1,000,000 at 12 months. The average rates per cent. were £3 18s 3d for the six months' bills and £3 5s 6d for the 12 months' bills.

Japan Investment.

LONDON, November 15.—One of the largest blocks of six months' treasury bills issued on November 10 has been allotted to the representatives of the Japanese government. These men have also placed large deposits in leading London banks.

FIRE ON AN OCEAN LINER

The Patria of the Hamburg-America Line

PASSENGERS AND CREW WERE SAFELY RESCUED.

Heroism of Captain and Crew Highly Commended.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—The Hamburg-America steamer Patria, Captain Frolich, which left New York on November 4 for Hamburg, is on fire at Dover. All the passengers were rescued and have arrived at Dover.

According to the interviewers, conversations with the passengers elicited the fact that most of them are Americans who have come over for their vacation in Europe.

All were ordered on deck at six o'clock on Wednesday morning when they were informed that a disastrous fire had broken out among the general cargo and as the crew were unable to cope with it the Captain said that he considered it advisable for the passengers to take to the boats.

At this time the fire had obtained a thorough hold upon the cargo. The smoke and flames were ascending with overpowering force, and causing the greatest alarm. The crew worked like heroes in the splendid endeavour to keep the flames under, but the great quantity of lined steel among the cargo made all efforts hopeless. There was great excitement among the women and the children, but the example of superb coolness set by the captain and the crew had a calming effect on the passengers. A steamer came along and picked up the passengers from the boats.

The captain of the Patria remains aboard the steamer at Dover.

Essington, B. C., Burnt Out.
