Dink Tender Sparks Lively Discussion

GEORGETOWN — The December meeting of the Georgetown Town Council, which had been postponed from Monday, Dec. 14, was held in the Council Chambers Thursday night.

Minutes of the last regular meeting and of a special meeting of a special meeting were read. The chairman of the various committees presented their reports.

The report of the public property committee presented by Councillor Lavandier sparked a lively exchange on the question of the recently let tender for the Rink Building.

Councillor J. F. Johnson, who was absent from the special council meeting at which the tender was opened and awarded, took strong objection to the granting of the tender and registered his objection to it.

Councillor Walker of the public property committee stated that the former parties operating the Rink Building had been requested to meet with the committee and assess damages to the building during their occupancy and also to value any new work and materials that they, the former managers, had installed.

This request was made by letter and Councillor Johnson claimed the committee should have personally contacted the parties.

Montague Rink Nears Readiness

MONTAGUE — The Montague hockey and skating rink expects to be in full swing by Christmas with the first skate on Christmas Eve or possibly in the afternoon.

Kenneth MacPhee and Lloyd Fraser, the managers of the rink, which is now owned by Irving Oil Ltd., are two well-known sportsmen and business men of the town and have been working hard to get the rink for the past two to three weeks.

The temperature stays near where it is now skating for Christmas eve is assured.

For sometime it was feared the community might be without facilities for hockey and skating for this winter, however MacPhee and Fraser indicated earlier in the year they would perhaps operate the old hockey rink. Permission was granted to them to do so by the owners for the 1964-65 winter season.

In the hope of the Community Welfare League Limited members, former owners of the rink, to be able to begin erecting a new \$65,000 rink before next season. Negotiations are going on where Requeim took with the Montague Town Council to see just when and how the necessary money can be raised.

The league currently has approximately \$25,000 from the sale of the old rink which is being used for the new rink. It is hoped that work can begin this winter under the winter works program which would save the community a considerable sum. The league is expected to make an announcement on the matter shortly.
