

Convent De Notre Dame.

ANNUAL EXAMINATION.

The annual examination of the pupils attending the Convent De Notre Dame commenced on Tuesday and ended last evening. The examination was conducted under the supervision of his Lordship, the Bishop of Charlottetown, Rev. Dr. McDonald, Rev. James McDonald, D. D., Rev. A. McGillivray, Rev. Father Trudelle, (Hope River), Rev. Allan McDonald, (Fort Augustus), and Professor Caven, of Prince of Wales College.

We learn that the examination reflected great credit upon the institution and gave unmingled satisfaction to the examiners. At the close of the exercises, Professor Caven delivered an address in which he bestowed high praise upon the teachers and the pupils; and said that in his opinion the examination was the best that had been held for several years.

The distribution of prizes will take place on Thursday evening, the 30th inst., when there will be a grand Concert.

Gladstone as a Financier.

A LONDON DESPATCH of June 12th says that Gladstone's Supplementary Budget constitutes the great political event of the day. Everybody—Greenwood, of the St. James Gazette, excepted—admits the extraordinary ingenuity displayed in the new financial proposals. Every essential feature in the scheme has surprised alike Liberals and Tories. The secret was perfectly kept, Cabinet Ministers themselves being hardly aware of Gladstone's intentions till the eve of the delivery of the speech. It was supposed that the negotiations with France for a reduction of the wine duties had failed, and the French Tories alleged the failure to be one of the reasons for Say's resignation as Ambassador. The brewers are delighted, because they will be relieved of much vexatious interference. Business classes who pay the income tax will endure the additional penny cheerfully, confident that the burden will be only temporary. The country generally relies implicitly on Gladstone's financial genius to equalize the fiscal imposition next year. Beer drinkers hail the prospect of cheaper and better beer. The brilliant success of the Premier distracts attention momentarily from various intestine troubles in the Liberal party.

Mr. Doutré's Fees in the Fishery Case.

SUEING THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT FOR A BALANCE OF \$10,000.

The action in which Mr. Doutré Q. C., is plaintiff, and the Dominion Government, as representatives of the Queen, is defendant, is now going on. The suit is brought to recover \$10,000, being the balance of \$18,000 for plaintiff services as leading counsel in the great fishery case against the United States. The witnesses examined were all leading counsel at the Montreal Bar, and their evidence showed what fine fat pickings fall occasionally to the gentleman of the long robe. Mr. Kerr, Q. C., stated that he had recovered fees of \$5,000 and \$4,000 in cases on which he had been employed. Honorable Mr. Laflamme, Q. C., testified that he had been paid fees of \$4,000 and \$5,000 by the Government in cases connected with the seigniories in this Province. Mr. Robertson, Q. C., had received \$12,000 from the Government as fees in settling cases of land claims connected with the canals. Mr. Ritchie, Q. C., had frequently received from \$1,000 to \$1,500 for services in which he was employed; he stated that the receipt of fees of \$500 to \$1,000 were of ordinary occurrence by leading lawyers there. As Crown prosecutor against the St. Albans raiders, his fee was \$1,000. All testified to Mr. Doutré's claim being moderate.

Bishops are still very much respected in England, and justly so, for they are, John Ruskin and John Bright notwithstanding, a hardworking and earnest body of men. But they are no longer looked upon as more than human. Their broad brim hats, silk aprons and knee breeches no longer awe the laity as they did a few score years ago, when a parish clerk was so filled with worship at a visit to the church by the bishop of the diocese, that he compose for the choir a new version of one of the psalms, which was sung joyfully to the prelate's astonishment:— "The little hills do skip like rams, The mountains likewise hop, And all the trees do bow their heads Before the lord bishop."

The fall of Arica, is perhaps the most serious calamity which has befallen the Peruvian cause on land. This city has been the headquarters of the army, it being situated on the coast far down to the south. Ever since the opening of the war it has been the centre of the struggle. It is the outlet of commerce from Bolivia, that province being inland, or at least without any seaport. If the allied forces which occupied the town has been captured, the Chilean victory will perhaps end the struggle, and foreign intermediation will be asked. England has already been solicited by South American bond holders to consent to act, and the Government has consented if called upon. Some British war vessels are already in the vicinity looking after British and foreign interests.

THE WORLD'S REGATTA.

Ross Wins by 20 Lengths.

TIME 28.54.

A despatch received in this city last evening announced that Wallace Ross won the professional single scull race at Providence, R. I., with Hanlan and Plaisted ties, and Frenchy Johnston, the negro oarsman, fourth. It also stated that Ross made remarkably quick time. Particulars received by telegraph to-day contradict the above, and give the following correct positions of the oarsmen at the close of the race:—

- Ross, 1st, Riley, 2nd, Plaisted, 3rd, Hanlan 4th, Ten Eyck, 5th.

All went off together on a good start. Hanlan led the first mile, followed by Ross, who was a half length behind—both pulling their level best. Hanlan suddenly stopped and put a hand to his side. Ross then forged ahead and led by several lengths, with Riley and Plaisted fighting for second position. Hanlan started again and rowed leisurely in company with Ten Eyck. Ross turned the wrong buoy, and perceiving his mistake, went back again, turned the right one, and still maintained the lead, which he increased to twenty lengths at the finish. Riley and Plaisted rowed together the greater part of the course. On the homestretch Riley spurred in splendid style, and at length gained a goodly lead, and finished second, with Plaisted third, Hanlan fourth, and Ten Eyck a short distance in rear of the Champion. The time was 28.54, being remarkably good for a four mile course.

The four richest men in the world are said to be the Duke of Westminster, Senator Jones of Nevada, the chief of the Rothschilds, and Mackay, owner of the grand silver bonanza. The Duke, poor man, has an income of only \$4,000,000 a year or thereabout. Nevada Jones is a little better off. His income reaches \$5,000,000 a year. The Rothschild is just twice as well off, having \$1,000,000 per annum. While McKay, once a poor Irish boy without a bawbee, and fifteen years ago worth less than nothing, manages, they say, to rake in about \$13,750,000 every twelve months.

WOODSTOCK IRON WORKS.—Mr. Salisbury, a capitalist, of Rhode Island, has completed the purchase of the Woodstock Iron Works, N. B., for a Company. Arrangements have been made with the New Brunswick Railway to run a branch to the mines. Operations have already commenced in repairing the buildings, furnaces, etc., and securing the large quantity of wood which will be needed. —St. John Sun.

The American trotters now being imported into England are attracting much attention among stud masters on the other side. The Prince of Wales is said to express the greatest interest in this new breed, and has become the purchaser of one or two of the fastest horses brought over.

The Dufferin Terrace stands at an elevation of 186 feet over the river; the summit of the flagstaff on the Citadel is 162 feet higher than the Terrace, and 343 feet over the river.

The Ottawa Herald says.—"Enquiry has elicited the information from several of our merchants that business has been much better this summer than it was last year.
