Fighting to keep their rights in the Suez Canal area and the Sudan under treaties Egypt has scrapped, British officials imposed drastic embargoes on rail and road traffic at the canal. They were trying to enforce an ultimatum for Egyptians to return to work unloading British supply ships.

Egyptians scrawled signs on sidewalks and buildings saying "Down with Britain" and "Get out, dogs." They covered the European lettering on taxi licence plates, leaving only the Arabic numerals, and removed signboards in English from their shops.

Newspaper Reports Cairo newspapers printed these reports: "Thousands of fighters" from Iran, Pakistan and other Moslem countries have volunteered to help Egypt.

Training camps have been established to prepare young Egyptians to fight against Britons. British military spokesmen said all railway traffic across the Suez zone was stopped at 6 A.M. except for trains supplying food to the zone's civilian population and two trains carrying supplies to Egyptian troops east of the canal.

All road traffic between Suez and Cairo was stopped at the same time. The Britons were moving their supplies by truck. Egyptian officials reported 250 oil trucks and 50 railway oil cars were blocked at Suez and said the embargo would have a "sharp effect" on Egypt's economic life.

Public opinion polls so far support this conclusion. In the election, their forecasts of the popular vote, based on repeated communications of cross-sections of the nation, proved accurate to within narrow limits.

Before Prime Minister Attlee announced the date of the coming election, the public opinion polls showed a considerable majority favoring the Conservatives.

Labor Closing Gap With the election drawing closer, however, the gap has been gradually closing as many hitherto undecided voters at last make up their minds to give Labor another chance.

Last year, Labor closed a similar gap almost at the last moment. This time, political observers are wondering whether they have too much distance to make up.

The "unknown quality" in all statistics of this nature is the sizeable group of people who reply "don't know" up until the last moment. If the majority of this section decide finally to throw their weight on the side of Labor, the Conservatives may again be beaten at the wire.

Liberal A Factor The Liberal vote, amounting to over 2,800,000 in the last election, is also a factor of vital importance which makes too confident prediction a foolhardy business.

Liberals put out 475 candidates to fight the election in 1950. They won only nine seats. This time, they are putting only about 150 candidates into the field. This means that hundreds of thousands of Liberal supporters will have to decide whether to vote Labor or Conservative—or not vote at all.

B., but the Grand Falls Dr. Cyr, aged 36, is the only doctor of that name in New Brunswick. He has said that some of his medical credentials have been missing since last November.

In an interview today, Dr. Cyr said the man he remembered would "have nerve enough" to perform operations under difficult circumstances.

He was introduced to the husky "Dr. Hamann" in July, 1950, at Martin farm of the Brotherhood of Christian Instruction here, where the man was doing a novitiate as "Father John." The last time he saw Hamann was Feb. 2 of this year. He then accompanied him to Quebec where "Brother John" took vows.

Early this year Father John went to Notre Dame Seminary at Alfred, Maine, and then disappeared.

Dr. Cyr described the 200-pound-plus man as "very charming" and a "dynamic personality." He had

met them in a hotel room, asked to be excused for a moment and disappeared, according to reports here.

At Alfred, Sheriff Everett S. Knight said today that unclaimed mail, including replies to applications for enlistment in the Canadian armed forces, was awaiting Ceel Boyce Hamann. He said the mail is at Notre Dame Seminary, where Hamann had stayed.

The sheriff added that Hamann may be a graduate of Purdue University in Indiana. He appeared to have a doctorate in zoology and a master's degree.

Sheriff Knight said he had been informed that Hamann was known in Los Angeles as Dr. French and that inquiries about the mystery man's whereabouts had been made by Mount St. John of God sanatorium in that city.

A warrant for his arrest on a theft charge was sworn out after he left Alfred in a seminary car but the charge was withdrawn when the car was found in Boston, the sheriff said.
