Notes and Comments.

Dividends recently paid by law societies and banks, in Ontario, ranged from six per cent. to nine per cent.

The capacity of the Moncton sugar refinery is to be doubled. This will afford an additional guarantee that the price of sugar will be kept down and necessitate additional workers in Moncton to be fed from the farms of this Province and the country roundabout.

One million bushels of wheat have been shipped this fall from Port Arthur by steambow. Navigation will probably remain open until the middle of December. There are at present, says the Winnipeg Free Press, about 600,000 bushels of wheat in the elevators at Fort William and Port Arthur.

France is going to put an increased tax upon strong liquors as a means of checking their sale as much as possible, potato brandy and other strong and injurious liquor having come into use in the north since the vineyards of France became injured by the phylloxera. The Germans will be sufferers by the taxation if it becomes prohibitive, for they manufacture most of the infamously impure liquor which is drunk by the Belgians and the poorer classes in northern France.

An Opposition paper advocating the Wiman had remarked:—

"A diminution of customs receipts resulting from free trade with the United States would be a blessing in disguise if it forced the government and the people, as it probably would, to be more economical in their expenditures."

To which the Canning Gazette makes the following reply:—

"We think the disguise would be perfect, so much so that the blessing could never be recognized by the tax payers of Canada. Commercial Union is wanted because the government of Canada has too much money? It is well that some reason can be shown. Why not go a step farther and allege that it would be a blessing in disguise if it should, as it certainly would, force our farmers to be more economical in their expenditure, by compelling them to sell their produce in competition with that of the Western States? Oats at 25 cents per bushel, pork at three cents per lb., and beef at two, would bring down so much disguised blessing on our farmers that our valley would soon become like the farming regions of Vermont and New Hampshire."

The origin of that famous phrase "peace with honor," inseparably connected with the policy of Lord Beaconsfield after the Berlin treaty of 1878, is being discussed. Mr. Smalley, the English correspondent, contributes this information upon it: "The phrase is one of those which are of no date. It must have been used by different people. It was used on the day of the return of Lord Beaconsfield from Berlin by a Dover alderman. It remained in Lord Beaconsfield's mind, and resurfaced later in the day, though with a singular qualification. What he actually said, as he leaned out of the first floor window in Downing street, was "I have brought you Peace, I hope with Honor." I heard him." The reporter stripped it of its unnecessary words, and it passed into current political history as "peace with honor," the qualifying words, "I hope," becoming lost to the fickle popular memory.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Stanley Expedition Again.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.

The Evening Telegram has a special cable from London which says that the Herald has the following despatch:—Nassau, Nov. 29, 5 p. m.: I have just met Henry M. Stanley, Emin Pasha, Lieutenant Stairs, Mr. Jepson, Dr. Park Nelson, and Boony and five hundred and sixty men, women and children. I have found Stanley looking exceedingly hearty. I presented him with the American flag, with which I was entrusted, and it is now flying from Stanley's tent. The great explorer's hair is quite white, and his moustache iron grey. Emin Pasha is a slight, dark man, who wears spectacles. In the short conversation which I had with him, he said he did not wish for any honors for what he had done.

The Poisoned Candy Case.

ST. JOHN, Dec. 3.

William J. McDonald will be put on trial for the murder of Mrs. McKee on Thursday afternoon. Before the adjournment of the Court, C. W. Weldon, on behalf of the prisoner, appealed for permission to see the boxes privately which had contained the poisoned candy, but the Solicitor General opposed the application except the police officials were present. This condition Mr. Weldon would not accept and the Judge refused to make the order applied for.

Bloods in Trouble.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 3.

At the police court to-day a prominent dentist, whose wife left him some time ago, on account of cruel treatment was fined \$20, and two attached officers of the Royal School of Infantry five dollars each for disorderly conduct on the public streets. These three gentlemen raised quite a disturbance at the door of W. H. VanWart's house at an unreasonable hour a few nights ago while in a state of intoxication.

Tenants' Defence League Meeting.

DUBLIN, Dec. 3.

Redmond presided to-day at a meeting of one hundred branches of the Limerick tenants' defence league. He said that the societies had brought the landlords to their knees, and would deal the final blow that would crush the Smith-Barry syndicate, and cripple the action of the Government.

The Jesuits Attacked Again.

MONTREAL, Dec. 3.

There is much comment here on an article in Le Canada sharply attacking the Jesuits and holding them responsible for the present religious trouble in Canada. Le Canada is a Roman Catholic paper, which makes the article more than usually significant.

Portugal is Ready.

LISBON, Dec. 3.

The Portuguese government will announce to the European powers that Portugal is ready to prove unbroken occupation of the African territories now claimed by England, and furthermore that Portugal is determined to maintain possession of the territories in dispute.

Mr. Pope's Successor.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.

Frank Beard, a young Englishman has been appointed secretary to Sir John McDonald, vice Pope, promoted. The new private secretary was recently married to a daughter of Justice Taschereau, of the Supreme Court.

Loyster Hatcheries Proposed.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.

It is proposed to establish loyster hatcheries in connection with the fish hatcheries system, and with this in view, the Department of Fisheries is gathering all the necessary information on the subject.

The Cronin Trial.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.

In the Cronin trial to-day, after Judge Wing had sharply criticised the testimony of the microscopists for the prosecution, he closed his address, and Mr. Morgan took up the argument in behalf of the prosecution.

Military Rifle League.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.

The proposition to establish a Military Rifle League in Canada is receiving considerable support. It is probable that about fifty teams will join the League.

A Senator Dying.

MONTREAL, Dec. 3.

Senator Trudelle is dying at the Hotel Dieu Hospital here.
