

Ferries Handle Heavy Traffic

Extremely heavy weekend traffic was a renewed Tuesday afternoon rush. The New Brunswick and Canadian National Railway.

Capt. C. R. Hunter, president of Northumberland Ferries said his ships, the Lord Selkirk and the Lord Dufferin, handled an extra crossings each on Saturday and Monday. No cars were left at either end, he said. Although scheduled trips were able to handle the Sunday traffic, although it too was heavy, he noted. Final figures have not yet been compiled.

Monday was the heaviest day at Borden-Cape Tormentine, when the CNR ships carried 1,096 vehicles to the mainland and 600 to the island.

Saturday 633 vehicles were moved from Borden and 838 from Tormentine. Sunday's figures show 722 ferried to the mainland and 645 to P. E. I.

No extra trips were necessary at the Borden crossing although on some occasions a few cars had to be left on the wharf to await the next boat.
