THE ARCHBISHOP'S PASTORAL.

Sensation of the Day.

MONTREAL, Feb. 25. The Archbishop's pastoral came like a thunder clap. The grits are at their wits end as they relied upon American money to bribe constituencies. But Yankees won't plunk down unless the grits give pledges to resign the tariff making unreservedly to Washington.

The grits hesitate, as their scheme was to use the Unrestricted Reciprocity cry for all it's worth to capture the Government, never expecting to make a treaty and they fear the Yankees publishing their pledges. Archbishop Fabre's circular is no sensation, and has created widespread excitement. All the Quebec bishops will issue pastorals before election, urging the people to stand by the Government and resist traitors.

Bishop L. Fleche of Three Rivers, is preparing a powerful pastoral strongly denouncing any interference with the present condition of affairs.

A SPLIT IN THE CAMP.

When Rogues Fall Out.

MONTREAL, Feb. 25. A serious split has occurred between American and Canadian conspirators. The former are disgusted over disclosures of their scheme which they plainly see has ruined all the prospects of grit success in the elections. They are also dissatisfied with the grit declarations that under unrestricted reciprocity Canada would retain control of her own tariff from which they suspect that all the grits want is American money to assist them in gaining place and power, and that they are not sincere in their advocacy of unrestricted reciprocity. The Yankees refuse to furnish any money and the meeting in Montreal on Sunday was to arrange matters, but it failed.

TORONTO, Feb. 25. The Mail says the church action will have a most overwhelming influence in favor of the Government, and the liberals will not only have to fight against treason but much more formidable obstacles—the authority and influence of the Catholic Church. The Mail practically anticipates defeat.
