TORONTO, May 15—With the announcement of complete standing committees for the year, the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association which now represents 95 per cent of the Canadian daily press began its season's work which will include the development of its members advertising revenue, representations to parliament concerning second-class postal rates and similar matters affecting circulation costs, the price of newspaper and the relationship of the publishers with the advertising agencies.

In the last mentioned field material changes have taken place in the last five years. The recompense of the agencies has been made a standardized commission by practically all the daily newspapers, and the newspapers allow this commission to Canadian agencies to whom the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association has extended its franchise.

To obtain this privilege agencies agree to conform to recognized regulations, one of which forbids the rebating in any way of this commission to the advertiser.

In addition to the standing committees, the Association again participates in a joint commission to maintain touch between agencies and publishers. It is concerned with the affairs of both parties, but is independent of both. The publisher members this year are T. F. Drummie, Saint John, President of the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association; O. L. Spencer, Calgary; H. B. Muir, Kingston; W. B. Preston, Brantford; Victor Sifton, Winnipeg; and W. J. J. Butler, Toronto. The agency members of this commission are J. A. MacLaren, Toronto, President of the Canadian Association of Advertising Agencies; C. T. Pearce, Toronto; H. R. Cockfield, Montreal; and Adam F. Smith, Toronto.

**CHOCOLATE UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE**

One cup sifted cake flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, ¼ teaspoon salt, 2-3 cup sugar, ¼ cup softened butter, 1 well-beaten egg, 6 tablespoons milk, 1 square unsweetened chocolate (melted) ¼ teaspoon vanilla, 3 tablespoons butter, ¼ cup

sugar, 2 cups sliced canned peaches. Sift flour once, measure; add baking powder, salt and sugar, and sift together three times. Add butter. Combine egg, milk and vanilla; add to flour mixture, stirring until all flour is dampened. Add chocolate and blend; then beat vigorously 1 minute.

Melt 3 tablespoons butter in 8x8x2-inch or deep 9-inch round pan; add sugar, and cook and stir until thoroughly mixed. On this arrange peaches. Turn batter out on contents of pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit) 50 minutes, or until done. Loosen cake from sides of pan with spatula. Turn upside down on dish with peaches on top. Serve warm with plain or whipped cream. Canned apricots, pears or pineapple, or bananas may be substituted for peaches.
