

Reviews Objectives Of Conference On Education

"Unity of purpose and effort on the part of 19 sponsoring bodies" was the keynote of the Canadian Conference on Education, George G. Crokery, Director, C.F.E. said in an address before the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"The needs of Canadian children did not come to the fore as a result of a rash of conferences but rather a keener interest in general education by sponsoring bodies having a desire to participate," Mr. Crokery said in describing the steps taken to forward the general idea which will reach its peak at the conference in Ottawa early in February.

The purpose of the conference is to focus attention on the objectives and needs of education in Canada in the next decade and to seek ways and means to meet them. Areas of discussion will include organizations and curricula, quality and quantity of teaching personnel, financing of education, the role of home, agriculture, business, industry and organized labour in education.
