

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

GOOD WHEELING.—Mr. W. P. Doull made the run from his shop on Kent Street to Houston's Hotel, Brackley Point, yesterday, in sixty-two minutes. He left town at 1.25. The distance is something over 14 miles. More than half the road has lately been remade, and is very rough.

CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT.—An order in council bringing the Canada Temperance Act into force in Charlottetown, is published in the Canada Gazette, which came to hand last evening. The order is dated June 27th, 1894, and the Act is to take effect after the expiration of thirty days from that date.

AN HEROIC LITTLE GIRL.—The dwelling house of Kenneth McLennan, at Little Narrows, Cape Breton, was destroyed by fire on Saturday. The fire broke out about noon, when Mrs. McLennan and Mrs. McLennan were at work in the field, and the flames made such rapid headway that only a portion of the furniture could be saved. The fire was discovered by Mrs. McLennan's little girl, only six years old, who, before going to alarm her parents, hastened at once to remove from the house a younger child, who was at the time asleep in the cradle. This act showed great presence of mind for a child of her age. Mr. McLennan and family lost all their clothing and everything that was in the upper part of the house. The fire is supposed to have been caused by a package of matches igniting through some cause or other.

ACCIDENTAL DROWNING.

Inquest in View of the Body of Charles C. Shielerdine.—The Verdict. The body of Charles C. Shielerdine, drowned at Brackley Beach on Saturday, was brought to the city last night, and will be forwarded to Philadelphia by express to-morrow.

An inquest in view of the body was held before Dr. Bradshaw, coroner, yesterday. The jury were: Mark Wright, foreman; Alfred Shaw, John McCullum, Peter Gallant, Fred McInnis, Fred Shaw and A. H. Clements. Mr. E. H. Beer was the first witness. He said: I was slightly acquainted with Charles Shielerdine. I was present on the shore on the forenoon of the 14th inst., and saw Shielerdine, Miss Wilcox and Miss Hills bathing in the surf. They had been out in the water about half an hour when Miss Hills stood up and called for help. John M. Campbell was with me. We went out, and I brought in the body of Miss Wilcox, who was then dead. I saw Mr. Campbell assist Miss Hills ashore, but Mr. Shielerdine was nowhere to be seen. I saw the body of Charles Shielerdine floating on the water but could not say how many. They were out probably as far as the first reef. I had heard the body ashore, and I had seen the calls for help. As soon as I realized they were in danger and calling for help I went to their assistance.

Hector Macdonald, Brackley Point, was next examined. He said: I was not acquainted with deceased. I was alone when I found the body. I found it in about 8 or 9 feet of water, face down, on the bottom. I suppose it was there since Saturday. I found it near where they told me the ladies were brought in. I towed the body in and anchored it near the shore. I was out searching for the body yesterday in company with four other boats. I immediately drove to Charlottetown and reported the finding of the body to Mark Wright & Co. Water P. Doull, said: In company with Mark Wright and A. H. Clements, I proceeded to Brackley Point to take charge of the supposed body of Charles C. Shielerdine. We drove to the shore and found the body anchored a few yards out in about two feet of water. A. H. Clements and myself took the body ashore, and assisted by others placed it where it now lies. I do not identify the body. I was not acquainted with Shielerdine.

Even Houston said: I am proprietor of the Sea View Hotel. I recognize the body of the deceased as that of Charles C. Shielerdine. He had been boarding at my house about twelve days. I was not aware he had been bathing on Saturday, although he had been in the habit of bathing daily in company with Miss Hills and Miss Wilcox. I do not think he was a robust man, although he did not complain of any special trouble. I was not present when he was taken from the water. I first heard of the drowning about noon on Saturday. I saw Shielerdine last at 9.45 that day. He then appeared to be in his usual health. He left in company with the ladies to go to the shore. After a short deliberation, the jury returned the following verdict: "That the deceased, Charles C. Shielerdine, came to his death by accidental drowning when bathing in the surf at Brackley Beach."
