PARTIES who arrived from St. Peter's Island yesterday report that General Butler's yacht "America," grounded on the bar about three o'clock in the afternoon, but she came off with the rising tide and proceeded to her destination.

THE damage by the earthquake at Panama is more serious than was at first reported. Railway tracks and bridges were injured and traffic is suspended. Other shocks followed the first at intervals, and the residents are much alarmed.

WE omitted to state in yesterday's issue that the Ottawa Team—Sergeant Major McDougall, Capt. Stewart, Sergeant Allan, Sergeant Younker, Sergeant Hooper, Sergeant McKinnon, Corporal Davidson, and Sapper Davidson—returned home on Tuesday evening.

THE Transcript says—Rev. D. G. McDonald, of Sackville, preached in the Baptist vestry at Chester, on Sunday, to a large congregation. The sermon was a very effective one, and made a deep impression, apparently. The reverend gentleman will always be sure of a large congregation there.

INTELLIGENCE has been received at St. John's, Newfoundland, of the landing at Jackson's arm, on the northwest side of White Bay, of a company of French marines who hoisted the French tri-color, and erected temporary monuments bearing the insignia of France. The British North American squadron has left for the scene to investigate the matter.

FOR several days past some curiosity has been excited in Halifax by the appearance of a gas balloon floating over the city at different points. Captain Elledale, of the 10th company Royal Engineers, who is a practical balloonist of the British War department, is engaged in a series of experiments with a view to perfecting some inventions of his own in ballooning, and for this purpose uses a balloon, which he sends off from the summit of the Citadel attached to a long cord. Balloons are desired to play an important part in modern warfare, yet there is much in the use of them yet to be learned, and the information derived by the present experiments will probably prove very valuable.—Chronicle.

THE coal shipments from the port of Pictou for this week ending September 12th, were as follows: Halifax Co., 2,833 tons; Intercolonial Co., 2,335 tons; Acadia Co., 733 tons; Vale Co., 1,016 tons. Total, 6,927 tons. Total to date, 110,679 tons.

NEW French Wool Poplins opening to-day at YOUNG'S.

NOVA SCOTIA is to be numbered henceforth among the countries that import raw cotton. Fifty bales were landed at Windsor on Saturday, probably the first importation ever made into the Province for manufacturing purposes. The cotton factory at Windsor will begin work the last of this month.

WRITS have been issued for a general election in Newfoundland. For the district of St. George's and White and Boone Bay; nomination day will be October 16th and polling day October 21st. For the other districts October 30th and November 4th.

THE indignation of the English workmen has been aroused by a proposal by the merchants to invite Chinese labor to England. The labor organizations are making preparations to oppose them, and serious trouble is anticipated should any Chinese labor be introduced into the labor market.

THE Canada Pacific Railway directors are holding private conferences with a committee of the Corporation of Montreal to negotiate the transfer of the old City Hall on the water front to the company for a terminus. They want the building and site as a gift for laying out \$1,500,000 in improvements.

THE local editor of the Springfield, (Mass.) Republican, Mr. J. H. SAYS the Standard of Victoria, B. C.:—Among other recent shipments from this port for the eastern Provinces there is one which is especially noticeable as being the very first of the kind. This is the first shipment of the kind to that growing city, but we have no doubt a very large demand will result from this beginning. A portion of the consignment goes to Brantford.

A TELEGRAM was received at Halifax, 1st week, announcing that the troop ship Euphrates would be substituted for the Serapis, and would leave Pictou for Halifax on the 16th September. She will embark the Royal Munster Fusiliers and will proceed to Bermuda where she will embark two companies of the Royal Engineers, which she is to convey to England via Gibraltar. A SUPERB line of Black Cashmeres opening to-day at YOUNG'S.

THE Newfoundland fishermen catch about \$7,000,000 worth of cod every year, and how thoroughly the fish is utilized is thus stated in a letter from St. John's: "Every part of the cod is useful; the head fried is an excellent dainty—a kind of compound of sweetbread and calves' foot jelly; the tongues cut out and nicely browned in the frying pan is an improved imitation of the fried oyster; the skin is used for fine glue, the sounds are eaten or made into the singlass of the cook-book; the Norwegians grind up the bones for cattle feed; and the French buy the spawn for baiting their sardine fishing grounds."

MCGINNIS, the immigrant who told the sensational story of three murders that he committed in England, and thus secured his incarceration in the goal at Brockville, confesses that the story was manufactured from whole cloth and had not a single element of truth. He adheres to the story that his name is McGinnis and also that he was born in London. His reason for telling the yarn is that he was sent away from home, and in order to spite his relatives concluded to get into disgrace. He had relatives in both England and Ireland upon whom the confession would bring shame and disgrace. Since being incarcerated his mind has relaxed, and he now admits with shame and regret that he told a wilful lie.

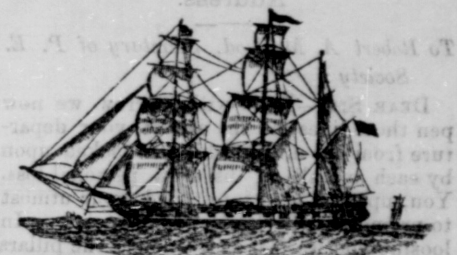

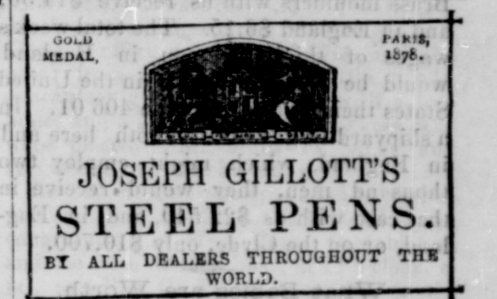
