CITY SCHOOL BOARD.

Mr. Cullen Resigns the Principalship of Queen Square School.

The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening.

After routine reports of the principals of the three city schools were read. These reports show the total enrolment during the month of January to have been 1365, a percentage of 87. The highest percentage of attendance in Prince Street School was in Mr. Seaman's and Miss Scott's departments, 95 per cent. each; in West Kent, Mr. Allan's, 94.8; in Queen Square, Mr. Cullen's, 93.

The property committee was authorized to furnish the vacant room in West Kent School.

Mr. Thomas E. Cullen, principal of Queen Square School, tendered his resignation. The resignation was accepted, and Mr. James R. Landrigan, principal of Kensington school, was appointed in his place. Mr. Landrigan's appointment from the Board will be \$315. He will begin work tomorrow. Mr. Cullen resigned because he did not receive the same salary as the other principals. The supplement paid Mr. McSwain was \$345, the Board offered Mr. Cullen \$325 to start with, which would make his salary \$650 a year. Mr. McSwain's total salary was \$670.

Miss Fennessy, a teacher in Queen Square School, was voted an addition of \$25 to her supplement.

An application from Mr. John McSwain for the position of teacher of drawing was laid on the table.

The Board decided that teachers must not allow the schools to be made a medium for advertising matters other than those relating to school work.

Meeting adjourned.

CARNIVAL TO-MORROW NIGHT.
