Ravages of La Grippe.

A telegram from Chicago, Ill., reports: It was thought last week that the death rate had reached its maximum, but when the Registrar of Vital Statistics Tomlinson closed his books at 6 o'clock on March 30 he had chronicled the death of nearly 300 people for the past 24 hours. This statement shows that Chicagoans are dying at the appalling rate of one every five minutes. Streets leading to the graveyards were filled all day with funerals. At one place on Warren Avenue three processions became tangled up, and it required several minutes to separate them. It was estimated that there were 600 bodies awaiting burial in Chicago on the 30th March. The hospitals are no longer able to take care of the sick, as every inch of available space has been taken by the swarm of sneezing and choking persons which poured into the doors last week. It is found that the deaths this week will reach the unprecedented figure of 1200. In New York the Health board reported six deaths on the 30th and on the following day 18 from the grippe. This makes 130 in all since the scourge made its last appearance. Two hundred policemen are down with the disease. At Pittsburg, Pa., there were seventy funerals on Sunday. Monday's list was somewhat larger. The majority of the dead were victims of grippe and kindred ailments. A whole family, consisting of Adam Barley, wife, sister and daughter, died the past week after a few days illness of grippe followed by pneumonia. They live near Stephen's City, Virginia.
