PARCEL POST SYSTEM IN ENGLAND.

It has been in Use Ten Years and has Grown Rapidly.

The act authorizing the parcel post was passed in 1882. But it may well be imagined that time was necessary to mount an entirely new postal service without disorganizing the ordinary mails, and it was not until Aug. 1, 1893, that the post was actually placed at the disposal of the public, says The London Times.

May 1, 1886, a new scale of weights and charges were issued. The scale, which still obtains, ascended by single instead of double pounds, and thus represented a charge of three pence for the first pound and one and a half pence for each succeeding pound.

At the same time the maximum weight was raised to eleven pounds, a parcel of that weight being carried for 18 pence. Compensation was provided for the loss or damage of any parcel in the post up to the sum of £1, while further sums of £5 and £10 might be secured by the payment of one penny and a two pence respectively.

The original scale of weights and charges was for a parcel not exceeding one pound, 3½ pence; for 2, 5 pence; for 3, 7 pence; for 4, 9 pence; for 5, 11 pence; for 6, 13 pence; for 7, 15 pence; for 8, 17 pence; for 9, 19 pence; for 10, 21 pence; for 11, 23 pence; for 12, 25 pence; for 13, 27 pence; for 14, 29 pence; for 15, 31 pence.

The effect of these changes at once became visible. From June, 1886, onward the number of parcels increased by more than 20 per cent over the number for the corresponding months of the previous year, and the total number of parcels sent for the year 1892 rose to 31,000,000.

In the meantime parcel posts had been established with many colonies and foreign states. The admirably managed post office of India and the post office of Egypt (organized by the country) were the first to respond to the invitation of the Postmaster-General and the interchange of parcels with India, Burma, Aden, and Egypt commenced July 1, 1885.

At the end of another six months Germany and Belgium had joined the ranks of this country in parcel post enterprise, and from the commencement of 1886 the work of connecting a large country with the rest of the world for the purpose of interchanging parcels by post proceeded apace.

The next change of importance took place June 1, 1891, when the system of registration was for the first time extended to inland parcels together with compensation of a liberal nature. For the ordinary registration, a fee of 2d compensation up to £5 was promised, or for parcels of 1d another £5 could be secured up to a maximum of £25. At the same time the compensation payable on an unregistered parcel was reduced from 4d to 2d.

Last, a scale of payment rising to £50 (which had previously been applied to the post to India and the West Indies, was adopted, and it is now possible to obtain compensation up to that amount by payment of the registration fee of 2d upon parcels of 1d in all.

It is not surprising that under the influence of these improvements the number of parcels sent per head of the population has more than doubled since the post was instituted.

So completely has the parcel post now become an adjunct of daily life that it is becoming difficult to suppose that ten years ago anyone wishing to send a parcel, even between two centers of population, could have done so without the aid of a parcel post. When it would be delivered, and how much he would have to pay; while rural districts were, for such purposes, practically out of reach.

When Brakenham Thompson—who, by the way, has never been found—opened a switch at Kingsbury, Ind., and sent a Wabash passenger train heading against a solid line of loaded freight cars, the indignant public would have no sympathy for him. Men who had worked on train crews were not so bitter. One of the prominent railway officials of Chicago, a well-known passenger agent—took the trouble to inquire into Thompson's record and learned that he had been one of the most intelligent, competent and careful men in the employ of the company.

"He has suffered his full penalty already," said the passenger agent. "I know what it is to live a year in two seconds. When I was a mere boy, crazy for railroading, I went out as a freight brakeman. One day our train was on a siding for an express to go by. I went ahead to the switch. Now, I was not thinking of switches, trains, or anything in the world except all sorts of punishment for him. Men who had worked on train crews were not so bitter. One of the prominent railway officials of Chicago, a well-known passenger agent—took the trouble to inquire into Thompson's record and learned that he had been one of the most intelligent, competent and careful men in the employ of the company.

"I jumped against the upright and the train went by on the main track. The engineer's face was white through the coal dust. I had no time to lock the switch. I simply lay against it until the last car had passed and then I dropped in a faint.

"That engineer knew me and never reported it. If he had, I wouldn't have been in the railroad for ten days."

Queer Collection of Pens. The patent office at Washington has a collection of pens that illustrates the difficulties with which men had to contend before they found a suitable instrument with which to write. There are the styluses used by the ancient; the instruments for writing on wax tablets, one end sharp like an awl, the other flat like a paper cutter. There are the brushes used by the Japanese and Chinese of the great day, and quills of every variety, together with an infinite number of steel pens. But the most curious are some quills pens with steel points. They were made in an effort to do away with the constant necessity for the mending of the pen, a process that few could perform, and that everybody hated. The effort was very ingenious, but unsuccessful, because the points could not be made to stay.
